Dogs in National Forest developed recreation areas have become a concern in recent years. Canine companions traditionally have been welcomed in the forest and in the wilderness. The few rules that apply to dogs are meant to assure that you and other forest visitors have an enjoyable outdoor recreation experience.

Regulations to Follow:

- Leave vicious or unusually noisy dogs at home.
 Because they may disturb or threaten others,
 they may not be permitted in public recreation areas
- At night, keep dogs and other pets inside an enclosed vehicle, inside a tent, or confined so as not to run loose.
- Please be considerate of other campers and forest visitors.
- Select a campsite on the edge of the campground and away from any water or shoreline.

- Do not leave dogs alone in a closed vehicle or tent while camping. Pets should never be left alone while on the forest.
- At all times, keep your dog on a leash <u>no more</u> than 6 feet long. Domestic animals are not permitted to run loose in recreation areas where they may disturb other forest visitors.
- <u>Pick up after your pet</u>. This may be the most neglected responsibility of pet owners. Take ownership of your pet and pick up all dog waste.
