BIKING

KOBEY PARK #103 & #508

Length: 6 miles one-way (9.7 km)

Difficulty: Moderate

Trail Use: Moderate

Beginning Elevation: 8,600 feet (2621 m)

Ending Elevation: 10,989 feet (3349 m)

USGS Map(s): Aspen, Ruedi

ATTRACTIONS/CONSIDERATIONS: Kobey Park is an old logging area with many spur roads winding through it. There are beautiful views of the Elk Mountains to the south. This is a fairly well maintained 4WD road, used by mountain bikes, 4 wheelers, dirt bikes, and snowmobiles in the winter.

ACCESS: Travel west from Aspen 7 miles on Highway 82 to the Woody Creek turn off. Turn right and travel downhill. Bear left at the next junction and continue to Woody Creek. Approximately 1/4 mile past the "speed bumps", make a sharp right onto Road #18. This road begins as a paved road, then turns into a dirt road. Continue on this road for approximately 8 miles to Lenado.

NARRATIVE: From Lenado, continue up the 4WD road. This road is sometimes called Christmas Tree Road since it winds back and forth across the mountain. There are numerous spur roads, stay on the main road. At the intersection, between Road #103 and #508. Keep going straight on Road #508 to Kobey Park (Road #103 goes to the right and heads to the Margy Hut).

ETHICS/REGULATIONS: Before you go out check into available routes, their condition, ownership of land, posted areas, regulations that apply, and the following rules:

- * Avoid running over young trees, shrubs, and grasses - **Stay on established routes.**
- * Avoid wetlands, meadows, steep hills, and streams where the surface is easily scarred by churning wheels.
- * Ford streams at designated sites only.
- * **Sanitation** - Bury human waste 100 feet from water and 6 inches in the soil.
- * A reminder: Wilderness Areas are closed to all mechanized vehicles, including mountain bikes.
