

## Climate Change



- The three-part framework provides for adaptive management in order to respond to stressors, such as climate change, and new information
- Consideration of climate change is required in each phase of the rule
  - $\propto$  Assessments 219.6
  - Ecological Sustainability 219.8(a)(1)(ii)
  - Integrated Resource Management 219.10(a)(9)
  - □ Monitoring 219.12(a)(5)(v-vi)
