Cathodic Protection Close Interval Survey

Dear Landowner:

Beginning May 14, 2012, Ruby Pipeline L.L.C. will be conducting a Close Interval Survey along the company's entire 42-inch natural gas transmission pipeline from the Opal Hub in Wyoming and terminating at Malin, Oregon. This survey will consist of a walk along the right of way, and possibly some minor use of an ATV, to check for proper Cathodic Protection readings on the pipeline. This survey will take approximately four months to complete. No excavation of the pipeline will be required. However, if the readings indicate that repairs are needed, you will be notified in advance of any work required on your property. If you have a tenant, we would appreciate it if you would inform them of this project.

Public Open House
Barry Point Fire
August 11, 2012

There will be an open house to reach out to the community of Lakeview to share the status of the fire and what the Incident Team has been doing.

Time and Date: Saturday, August 11, 2012 from 1-3 pm.
Location: Yurt in the briefing courtyard

The goal is to have community members who understand what the Forest and Team are trying to accomplish and who leave comfortable with and supportive of the actions that have taken place and those that are planned.

This meeting will be an open house format with no formal presentations or briefings. The Forest is preparing posters of some of the fire behavior, fire effects and suppression activities and what the team has been doing to meet the incident objectives.

There will be at least one resource advisor who can speak about the impacts to the grazing permittees. We are still verifying availability of other resource specialists.

We need support from the team in the form of individuals who can speak with members of the community about:

- the status of the fire
- previous and expected fire behavior and fire weather
- structure protection efforts
- any estimates we may have on growth expectations

We have submitted general message requests for:

- Signs directing public to parking and where the meeting is
- Maps to show fire perimeter and general points of interest to the public

In addition we will have information available on FireWise and Smokey Bear prevention materials, the Forest and Team objectives for the incident.
