Help Us Stop the Invasion Hemlock Woolly Adelgid

The USDA Forest Service is asking the public to help stop the spread of the Hemlock Woolly Adelgid—an invasive insect from Asia that is a deadly threat to Hemlocks on the Bankhead National Forest.

Current projections have the Hemlock Woolly Adelgid spreading at 15 miles per year. If projections are right, we can expect to see the invasive insect on the Bankhead by 2016.

The Forest Service is asking the public to assist by monitoring Hemlocks when visiting the Bankhead National Forest.

What to look for...

- ◆ White woolly masses at the base of needles on the underside of hemlock twigs
- ◆ Remember it is easily identified October through May
