## Brief Description of Project Area

Aspen Cabin, a historic log cabin encircled by a split rail fence and surrounded by pine, fir and aspen, is a nature lover's haven. This semi-primitive area is home to an abundance of wildlife, including deer, elk and squirrels. It's a bird watcher's paradise as well, with a variety of species including sparrows, jays, Sandhill cranes and woodpeckers. Wildflowers, such as Indian Paintbrush, Camas and wild lilies, add splashes of color.

Aspen Cabin was built in the summer of 1930 and was originally used as an administrative cabin by US Forest Service employees. No longer needed as a guard station, the Forest Service rents this cabin for overnight stay during the summer months. The Forest Service entered into a partnership with a local snowmobiling club to use the cabin as a warming shelter for snowmobilers and cross-country skiers during the winter months.

## Brief Description of Project Area

Located at an elevation 7536 ft, Bald Butte Lookout was built during the summer of 1931. It's constructed from an Aladdin L4 Lookout kit. All of the pieces were pre-cut to six feet or less in length, so that the entire kit could be packed by horses into the remote site. At one time, hundreds of these types of lookouts were in service throughout the Pacific NW, today only two such structures remain standing in Oregon. Forest Service employees and civilian volunteers worked together during the 1993 and 1994 summers to restore the lookout. They built the furniture in use today from the original 1930's plans.

Through the windows of this 14 x 14 foot building Forest Service personnel watched over Gearhart Mountain, Sycan Marsh, Yamsay Mountain, Lee Thomas Meadow, Slide Mountain, the upper Chewaucan River drainage, and all the forested country in between. During World War II, they kept a special vigilance for the balloons carrying firebombs from Japan. Year after year this stout little building sat perched atop the windy summit of Bald Butte.

## Brief Description of Project Area

Currier Guard Station was constructed in 1933 to house wildfire prevention crews in the field. The station was occupied seasonally by fire crews until the early 1990s. Currier Guard Station is located approximately 30 miles NW of the town of Paisley. It's a scenic, peaceful spot for relaxation, hiking, fishing, hunting, bird and flower watching and mountain biking.

The cozy, dove-gray Currier Guard Station is nestled beneath a thin line of Ponderosa Pine, Lodgepole Pine and Aspen groves. Behind the cabin, an expanse of meadow stretches to meet the forest's edge, providing a perfect habitat for a variety of wildlife, especially Red Tail hawks as they perch in treetops and glide across the meadow looking for field mice. Watch for the brilliant flash of red as the Red Breasted Sap Sucker swoops from tree to tree. Meadow Larks, Stellar Jays and hummingbirds also frequent the area. At night, listen for the gentle hoot of an owl and watch for bats fluttering and swooping to catch bugs.

## Brief Description of Project Area

A series of dome building volcanic eruptions, about 8 million years ago, gave birth to the 7,195 foot mountain. Hager Mountain was named after a pioneer settler in the Silver Lake Valley. The Klamath Indian name for the mountain was "chock-chock-lisk-se," which, when translated, means "bald faced rock."

Hager Mountain Lookout is perched on these bald faced rocks, offering 360 degree views as far as Mount Hood and Mount Shasta on a clear day. It is one of a diminishing number of lookouts still staffed for fire detection annually from June through October.

Williamson River Campground is a popular recreation spot located about 5 miles north of Chiloquin, Oregon on a primary Forest Service Road about one mile from US Highway 97. The campground has a capacity of 115 persons at one time. The campground is situated near the Williamson River in old growth ponderosa pine forest. In addition to camping, primary activities offered include fishing, boating, birding and trails. Williamson River Campground is adjacent to Collier State Park which offers camping with showers.
