MOUNTAIN YELLOW-LEGGED FROG... *Rana muscosa*



FEDERAL STATUS - Forest Service Sensitive

HABITAT - Inhabits sunny streambanks, meadow streams, isolated pools, and lake borders in the high Sierra Nevada from 4,500 feet to over 12,000 feet in elevation, and rocky streams in the mountains of southern California from 850 feet to 7,500 feet. Seem to prefer sloping banks with rocks or vegetation to the water's edge.

IDENTIFICATION CHARACTERISTICS - Weak dorsolateral folds, no mask, usually no snout patch (as in foothill yellow-legged frogs), no large eardrum (tympanum) behind the eyes (as in bullfrog), yellow on undersides of hind legs and waist. Toe tips usually dark. When handled they smell like garlic.
