## Accomplishments Provided with Recreation Fees:

- Provided stipends for campground hosts who provided visitor contact and education, as well as campground and boat site facility maintenance and cleaning.
- Funded wilderness rangers to conduct stewardship work in Bridger, Gros Ventre and Teton Wildernesses. Accomplishments included: Visitor contact and Leave No Trace education, campsite and air quality monitoring; removing invasive weeds; maintaining trailhead signage; and trail maintenance.
- Funded employees to maintain facilities and monitor conditions in the popular Snake River Canyon. This included providing information to visitors; implementing a group permit system; and improving and maintaining facilities.
- Partnered with Friends of Pathways to fund the Teton Pass Ambassador Program which focuses on providing visitor education and avalanche safety awareness in the heavily used Teton Pass Area.

## Bridger-Teton Accomplishments Continued

- Enhancements to the off-highway vehicle (OHV) program were accomplished including:
  - Nearly 11 miles of non-system routes were obliterated.
  - Eight new gates were installed.
  - Route signing was installed.
  - Volunteers were engaged in building barriers and rehabilitating non-system trail routes.
- Refurbished 30 forest information and directional signs.
- Completed trail maintenance and improvement on approximately 800 miles of trails in wilderness, backcountry and front-country settings. Work included supporting 386 volunteers who contributed 4,800 hours of labor on trail work.

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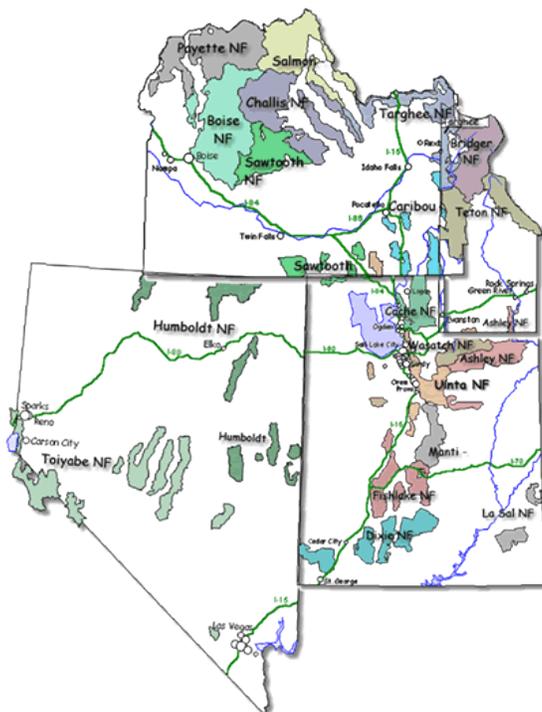
