EMERALD ASH BORER

Remarks:	Current known sitings in Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, and Maryland		
Scars and Marks:	Leaves dead ash trees in its wake, while under attack ash trees appear dying in the upper canopy, epicormic sprouting at base, D-shaped holes in bark. Under the bark are S-shaped tunnels woven through cambrium.		

CAUTION

Though under quarantine this insect continues to spread. On its own natural spread it might move 1/4 mile/year -but hitchhike on firewood, nursery stock, and wood products. This insect causes 100% mortality in ash. Be on the lookout! Don't move firewood or any ask products.
