If you're a camper heading out for a trip, do the forests a favor. Don't move firewood — it can potentially transport invasive species. Instead, buy it where you'll burn it, buy heat-treated firewood, or gather on site where permitted.

BUY IT WHERE YOU BURN IT.

How to Help:

Leave firewood at home — buy local firewood at or near your destination, or collect firewood on site when permitted.

Buy or collect only what you'll need, and use it all up by the end of your stay.

If you have already moved firewood use it immediately. Do not take it home with you, and do not leave excess firewood.

"the nation's finest"

Kentucky State Park policy prohibits out-of-state firewood unless it is bundled certified heat-treated. Visitors will need to show the receipt for firewood bought within Kentucky.

Kentucky's National Parks (Cumberland Gap National Park, Mammoth Cave National Park, and Big South Fork National River & Recreation Area) prohibits the movement of firewood to prevent the spread of invasive species.
