The Forest Service remains committed to working with partners and communities to restore native forest utilizing the following 8 Steps to a healthier forest:




Implementing controlled fire to renew vegetation growth and remove excess debris that fuel wildfire.



Managing forest lands that provide habitat for wildlife, clean air and water resources.



Planting native trees, such as longleaf pine seedlings that have a natural resistance to wildfire, wind, disease and the southern pine beetle.



OUR VISION: On the National Forests in Alabama, it is our mission to restore and maintain beautiful, resilient and productive landscapes, and to connect people to these landscapes through recreational, educational and economic opportunities.



Managing aquatic biodiversity by altering conditions to ensure construction projects conform to habitat maintenance standards.



Conducting forest inventories to collect forest information for analysis.



Implementing Geographic Information Systems (GIS) mapping to enhance ecosystem management.



Expanding partnerships by encouraging members of the public to care for the environment by planting trees or volunteering.



Fiscal Year 2022 Accomplishments

The National Forests in Alabama are part of the USDA Forest Service's National Forest System. There are 4 national forests and 6 ranger districts. The forests date back to the early 1900s and contain over 672,843 acres of public land.

The National Forests in Alabama planted approximately 515 acres of longleaf pine seedlings and 59 acres of shortleaf pine seedlings totaling 574 acres. The number of seedlings planted was approximately 350,715 longleaf pine seedlings and 40,179 shortleaf pine seedlings totaling 390,894 seedlings.
