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| 1 | Is the Forest Plan still relevant? | As the purpose of this NFMA requirement is to give notice of the agency's intent to prepare an environmental impact statement for a forest plan revision. The data gathered from the monitoring program in total will advise the Forest of the need for change. |
| 3 | How close are projected costs with actual costs? | This is adequately tracked with the Forests annual project prioritization and budgeting process when setting up the annual program of work. Annual accomplishments and spending by budget code is reported at the the end of each year in the year end reports. |
| 4 | Are insects and disease organisms increasing to potentially damaging levels following management activities? | Forest pests and pathogens are being tracked in the new question number 6. |
| 5 | What are the effects of Forest management being planned on land, resources and communities adjacent to or near the National Forest? What are the effects on National Forest management from activities on nearby lands managed by other Federal or other governmental agencies or under the jurisdiction of local governments? | 1) The 1982 planning rule provisions required that forests coordinate with other public planning efforts during development or revision of a forest plan. This effort occurs when the forest is ready to enter into plan revision. The Forests will meet this requirement as we move into our next plan revision. The monitoring plan reports the forests goods and services produced and level of managment that may affect communities adjacent or near the Forests. |
| 9 | How much even-aged management (especially clearcutting) should be used, and in what forest types should it be used? | This is addressed in Appendix B of the Forest Plan. |
| 12 | What are the identified research needs? | Any research needs identified will be brought forward in each monitoring report but is itself will not be a question that will be included. |
| 13 | What Standards, Guidelines, or Objectives are not being met? | Any reports on Standards and Guidelines and Objectives not being met will be reported by specialists in their sections of the monitoring report, but this question will not be carried forward as a question on its own. |
| 14 | What are the amounts, distribution, and types of available habitats? | Too general and too broad to provide useful information- new habitat monitoring protocol for the 2012 Planning Rule replaces this. |
| 17 | How many acres of the Forests have been inventoried and classified using an approved Aquatic Ecological Classification System | Removed - System is too expensive to implement. New Monitoring questions have been developed to monitor watershed conditions (see question 1). |

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| 18 | How many acres of early successional habitat in riparian areas occur on each Forest? Does this level of habitat provide adequate species viability? | New Question 4 encompasses this question about species viability. |
| 19 | How many areas and how many acres of semiprimitive non-motorized and motorized areas are being provided? | Due to SEIS, only one area meets the SPNM ROS class and change would only occur with a Plan amendment or revision. |
| 20 | What is the distribution of National Forest System acres by fire hazard rating? How many acres in fire-dependent ecosystems and at-risk urban-rural interface and intermix areas have been reduced by at least one hazard rating class? | Adequately tracked through targets and accomplishments. New Question 11 will track acres treated by mechanical and prescribed fire by Wildfire Condition Class. |
| 21 | What is the distribution of National Forest System acres by fire condition class? How many acres have been treated that result in an improvement of at least one fire condition class? What is the number and size of wildfires? | Adequately tracked through targets and accomplishments. New Question 11 will track acres treated by mechanical and prescribed fire by Wildfire Condition Class. |
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
