**Subject:** Forest Order No. 05-15-00-16-12 – Fire Restrictions

This document explains my rationale and the regulatory basis for implementing temporary fire restrictions on the Sierra National Forest.

Criteria for activation of prohibitions through Forest Orders are based on National Fire Danger Rating System indices and fuel moisture conditions. Current conditions reflect a range of Burning Indices from 38 to 124, and a thousand hour fuel moisture of less than 14%, with a predicted stable weather pattern and drying trend. Per the current Sierra National Forest Restriction and Emergency Closure Plan, these conditions meet the criteria for entry into restrictions.

Line Officers as well as Forest Fire Management and Prevention Staff have assessed Recreation Sites and Wilderness Areas on the Forest. Those areas that lack flammable material or have had flammable materials removed to prevent fire ignitions from escaping into the wildland are listed on Exhibits A and B.

As of July 22, 2016 flammable materials have been removed and the threat of fire ignition's escaping into the wildland have been reduced at Rocky Point Day Use, Pine Slope Day Use, Lakeside Day Use, Denver Church Day Use, Little Denver Church Day Use and Recreation Point Campground. Hence, these locations have been added to Exhibit B making them exempt from applicable prohibitions listed in the Order.

As of August 23, 2016 flammable materials have been removed and the threat of fire ignition's escaping into the wildland have been reduced at Lupine Cedar Campground. This location has been added to the list in Exhibit B making it exempt from applicable prohibitions listed in the Order.

I have concluded that this decision may be categorically excluded from documentation in an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) or Environmental Assessment (EA) under the National Environmental Policy Act. This action falls within the category identified in 36 CFR 220.6(d)(1) – prohibitions to provide short-term resource protection or to protect public health and safety – and does not require documentation in a decision memo, decision notice, or record of decision. I have determined that there are no extraordinary circumstances associated with this temporary closure. Implementation of the decision may begin immediately.



SIERRA NATIONAL FOREST  
Forest Order No. 05-15-00-16-12  
Fire Restrictions

Pursuant to 16 USC 551 and 36 CFR 261.50(a) and (b), and to provide for public safety and protect natural resources, the following acts are prohibited within the Sierra National Forest. This Order is effective from August 26, 2016, through the end of the official 2016 fire season.

1. Building, maintaining, attending or using a fire, campfire, or stove fire, except within the Designated Wilderness Areas listed in Exhibit A or the Designated Recreation Sites listed in Exhibit B. 36 CFR 261.52(a).
2. Smoking, except within an enclosed vehicle or building, or within the Designated Wilderness Areas listed in Exhibit A or the Designated Recreation Sites listed in Exhibit B. 36 CFR 261.52(d).
3. Welding, or operating acetylene or other torch with open flame. 36 CFR 261.52(i).
4. Operating an internal combustion engine, except on a National Forest System road or trail. 36 CFR 261.52(h).


Pursuant to 36 CFR 261.50(e), the following persons are exempt from this Order:

1. Any Federal, State or local officer, or member of an organized rescue or firefighting force in the performance of an official duty.
2. Persons with a permit from the Forest Service specifically authorizing the otherwise prohibited act or omission. Persons with a valid California Campfire Permit are not exempt from the prohibitions listed above. However, persons with a valid California Campfire Permit may use a portable lantern or stove using contained gas, or pressurized liquid fuel with a fuel shut off valve.
3. Persons with a Special Use Permit from the Forest Service for a recreation residence on the Sierra National Forest may use a campfire or stove fire at their recreation residence.

These prohibitions are in addition to the general prohibitions in 36 CFR Part 261, Subpart A.

A violation of these prohibitions is punishable by a fine of not more than \$5000 for an individual or \$10,000 for an organization, or imprisonment for not more than six months, or both. 16 USC 551 and 18 USC 3559, 3571, and 3581.
