

Order No. 06-15-03-16-359
14 Day Camping Limit
Umpqua National Forest
Diamond Lake Ranger District

Pursuant to 16 U.S.C. § 551 and 36 C.F.R. § 261.50(a), to provide for an equitable camping experience and protect natural resources, the following acts are prohibited within the Diamond Lake Ranger District of the Umpqua National Forest as described below and shown in attached maps Exhibit A through C. The Order is effective beginning September 14, 2016 and ending on September 14, 2018, unless rescinded sooner.

1. CAMPING by any person or group, within the boundaries described below and identified in Exhibit A through Exhibit C maps, for more than 14 days within a 45 day period.
36 CFR 261.58(a)

Camping means the temporary use of National Forest System lands for the purpose of overnight occupancy without a permanently-fixed structure.

Forest Service Road 60 corridor's affected area of closure begins at the turn off of Highway 138 and extends to the pavements end, and is valid within 300' of both sides of FS Road 60 as defined by the attached maps.

Stockdale Pond, Toketee Airstrip, Cedar Springs, Camas Creek, and Thielsen Forest Camps areas of affected closure includes a half mile radius in all directions from each site as defined by the attached maps.

Windigo, Cinnamon, Three Lakes, and North & South Diamond Sno-parks areas of affected closure extend in a half mile radius in all directions from each sno-park as described in the attached maps.

The following developed campgrounds will also be included in the closure:

- Broken Arrow Campground
- Bunker Hill Campground
- Clearwater Falls Campground
- Clearwater #1 Forbay Campground
- Clearwater #2 Forbay Campground
- Diamond Lake Campground
- East Lemolo Campground
- Inlet Campground
- Kelsay Valley Campground
- Kelsay Valley Horse Campground
- Lemolo 2 Forbay Campground
- Poole Creek Campground

- Thielsen View Campground
- Toketee Lake Campground
- White Horse Falls Campground

Pursuant to 36 C.F.R. § 261.50(e), the following persons are exempt from this order:

1. Any Federal, State, or local Officer of an organized rescue or fire fighting force in the performance of an official duty.
2. Persons with a permit specifically authorizing the otherwise prohibited act or omission.

These prohibitions are in addition to the general prohibitions in Title 36 CFR Part 261, Subpart A.

A violation of these prohibitions is punishable by a fine of not more than \$5,000 for an individual or \$10,000 for an organization, or imprisonment for not more than 6 months or both. 16 U.S.C. § 551 and 18 U.S.C. §§ 3559, 3571, and 3581.
