

# INTERMOUNTAIN REGION Forest Plan Revision

*Managing public lands with a 21st century vision*

Every national forest in the Forest Service operates under a land management plan. Most of the original plans were developed in the early to mid eighties after the creation of the National Forest Management Act. Near the turn of the 21st century, national forests began updating their plans in a process called Forest Plan Revision. The requirements for Forest Plan Revision are in federal regulation, referred to as the "planning rule" and recently revised in 2012.

The Intermountain Region has a goal that each national forest will be able to revise its plan within 4 years of its start date.



7 National Forests within the Intermountain Region will be completing Forest Plan Revision





Plans will be revised in a manner that encourages participation from publics, stakeholders, and other agencies to reflect a broad and inclusive vision for managing national forests. Plans will cover:

- Environmental and ecosystem health
- Air, water and soil quality
- System drivers, including disturbance processes, natural succession and climate change
- Social, cultural and economic factors
- Infrastructure, such as recreational facilities, recreational settings and transportation corridors
- Designated areas, including wilderness and wild and scenic rivers

Public outreach and public engagement through collaboration, information sharing, and participation will be a priority.
