Access:

- From I-70 exit 147 for Eagle, turn south on Eby Creek Rd to the Route 6 roundabout.
- At roundabout, turn right (west) on Route 6/Grand Ave and travel 0.8 miles to next roundabout.
- At this roundabout, take the third right onto Sylvan Lake Road.
- Continue 1.6 miles to Brush Creek Road, and take a right on Brush Creek Road.
- Follow Brush Creek Road for roughly 9 miles to the fork of East and West Brush Creek.
- Turn left onto East Brush Creek Rd., FDR 415 and drive 6 miles until you reach the parking lot and trailhead information board.
- The trail to the left is Fulford Cave- FDT 1875, the trail to the right is Lake Charles-FDT 1889.

Facilities:

- All the sites are partially shaded with fire rings and picnic tables.
- The sites are small and clustered together and only one can accommodate a vehicle up to 25 feet long.
- Please pack out your trash.

Natural Features:

- Fulford Cave Campground, at an elevation of 9,400 feet, is located in a sparse stand of spruce/fir and aspen.
- Active beaver ponds and East Brush Creek are nearby
- The campground overlooks Yeoman Park.

Attractions

- **History-** A visit to the historic mining town of Fulford is just a few miles up FDR 418. Foundations of an old Civilian Conservation Corps camp built in the 1930's can be seen in the meadow northwest of the campground.
- **Hiking-** There are three popular trails beginning next to the campground. Fulford Cave-FDT 1875 goes up to the entrance of Fulford Cave. Lake Charles-FDT 1899 goes up to Lake Charles in the Holy Cross Wilderness and then on to Mystic Island Lake. Ironedge-FDT 1873 leads to the Peter Estin 10th Mountain Division Ski Hut and then goes on to Lake Charles.
- **Fishing-** East Brush Creek, running next to the campground, has both brook and rainbow trout.
- **Fulford Cave-** This popular cave has a great variety of features to discover and explore. Cave exploration can be exciting, but visitors are reminded that caves can be dangerous and that special equipment is needed for a safe trip. Cave users are responsible for their own safety.
