Although much of the Shawnee is covered in forests, there are open areas that provide good locations for viewing the eclipse. National forest land extends across southern Illinois from the Ohio River to the Mississippi River and is intermixed with private land, so be sure you are on public land before setting up your camp or picnic.

You can camp at these sites too! With little or no trees, they are ideal locations for your eclipse experience.

### **Dispersed Camping Options**

Primitive camping is allowed on National Forest land ¼ mile outside the boundaries of developed campgrounds and picnic areas. Primitive camping is <u>NOT</u> allowed within Natural Areas, Research Natural Areas, on trails or within 150 feet of a lake or stream. There is no fee for primitive camping in the general forest areas, however visitors are limited to camping a maximum of 14 continuous days.

# **Forest Roads**

Rural roads in the Shawnee include roads that are under state, county and Forest Service jurisdiction. County and Forest Service roads are usually unpaved and narrow. Parking along Forest Service roads is allowed, but drivers should not block traffic or cause resource damage from parking on wet or soft soils.

Detailed road maps are available on our website, by mail order or at Shawnee office locations in Vienna, Harrisburg and Jonesboro. For a list of current road closures, go to *Alert*s on our website.

# **Outdoor Safety**

- Call 911 if you have an emergency.
- Plan ahead and prepare for your visit.
- Let someone know your travel plans.
- Obtain maps or GPS locations of the area that you are planning to visit.
- Carry plenty of water and food.
- Be aware of changing weather conditions, high temperatures and humidity.
- Be aware of your surroundings. High bluffs, abandoned cisterns and dead standing trees are present throughout the forest.
- Cell phone reception may be weak or non-existent in parts of the Shawnee.
- Ticks and other insects are abundant. Insect repellent is recommended.
- Poison ivy is widespread. Learn what it looks like so that you can avoid it. Wash skin and clothing after coming in contact.
- Venomous snakes occur in southern Illinois. Be cautious, watch where you step or place your hands.
