



STAGE 1 FIRE RESTRICTIONS



ARE IN EFFECT FOR THE OKANOGAN-WENATCHEE NATIONAL FOREST

THE FOLLOWING IS PROHIBITED:



FIRES, CAMPFIRES, CHARCOAL, COAL, AND WOOD STOVES

Campfires are allowed **ONLY** at designated recreation sites, mostly fee campgrounds with campfire structures designed / installed by the Forest Service or permittee, and Recreation Residences or Group Camps under permit from the Forest Service. Campfires are also allowed in designated Wilderness Areas, except specific locations where they are never allowed.

Pressurized or bottled liquid fuel stoves, lanterns, or heating devices are permitted, provided such devices are used in areas that are barren or cleared of all overhead and surrounding flammable material within 3 feet of the device.



USING AN EXPLOSIVE (always in effect)



POSSESSING, DISCHARGING, OR USING ANY FIREWORKS (always in effect)

The National Forests use fire restrictions to help prevent unwanted, human-caused fires and to limit the exposure of visitors during periods of potentially dangerous fire conditions. Additional restrictions may be applied as conditions warrant. Fire restrictions typically remain in effect until the forest receives significant precipitation, at which time the restrictions will be rescinded.
