

Install GPS-enabled mobile maps on your smartphone or tablet

Smartphones or Tablets: Install the **Avenza Maps** app on your smartphone or tablet. The app is available for FREE from the Apple Store (iPhones and iPads), from the Google Play Store (Android smartphones and tablets), and from the Amazon App Store (Kindle Fire tablets). Then, install a free QR code app, like QR Code Reader.

QR Code: Get a color version of this map by scanning the QR code and accepting the resolution. The Travel Map includes road, trail, and area designations. For more information, see <http://www.usda.gov/nfs> (look for the "Travel Map" link).

WiFi connection: Recommended for this download on your device. Once downloaded, map content is stored on your device, and the GPS feature on your device is needed to navigate.

PURPOSE AND CONTENTS OF THIS MAP

The designations shown on this motor vehicle use map (MVUM) were made by the responsible official pursuant to 36 CFR 212.21, as effective as of the date on the front cover of this MVUM, and will remain in effect until superseded by next year's MVUM.

It is the responsibility of the user to acquire the current MVUM. This MVUM shows the National Forest System roads, National Forest System trails, and the areas on National Forest System lands in the Coconino National Forest that are designated for motor vehicle use pursuant to 36 CFR 212.21. This MVUM also identifies the vehicle classes allowed on each route and in each area, and any seasonal restrictions that apply on those routes and in those areas.

Designation of a road, trail, or area for motor vehicle use by a particular class of vehicle under 36 CFR 212.21 should not be interpreted as encouraging or inviting use or implying that the road, trail, or area is available, actively maintained, or safe for travel. Motor vehicle designations include parking along designated routes and at designated locations. Seasonal weather conditions and natural events may render designated roads and trails more difficult to travel. Designated areas may contain dangerous or impassable terrain. Many designated roads and trails are accessible only by high clearance vehicles or four-wheel-drive vehicles. Maintenance of designated roads and trails will depend on available resources, and many may require winter maintenance.

This motor vehicle use map identifies those roads, trails, and areas designated for the motor vehicle use under 36 CFR 212.21 for the purpose of enforcing the prohibition in 36 CFR 261.13. This is a limited purpose. The other public roads are shown for information and navigation purposes only and are not subject to designation under the Forest Service travel management regulations.

These designations apply only to National Forest System roads, National Forest System trails, and areas on National Forest System lands.

PROHIBITIONS

It is prohibited to possess or operate a motor vehicle on National Forest System lands on the Coconino National Forest other than in accordance with these designations (36 CFR 261.13).

Violators of 36 CFR 261.13 are subject to a fine of up to \$5,000, imprisonment for up to 18 months, or both (18 U.S.C. 3071(e)). This prohibition applies regardless of the presence or absence of signs.

This map does not display nonmotorized uses, over-snow uses, or other facilities and attractions on the Coconino National Forest. Obtain forest visitor information from the local national forest office.

Designated roads, trails and areas may also be subject to temporary emergency closures. As a visitor, you must comply with signs notifying you of such restrictions. A national forest may have a fire, health, or safety emergency in an area. Such temporary and/or emergency closures are consistent with the Travel Management Rule (36 CFR 212.21), 36 CFR 261 (Subpart B).

The designation "road or trail open to all motor vehicles" does not supersede State law.

EXPLANATION OF LEGEND ITEMS

Roads Open to Highway Legal Vehicles Only:

These roads are open only to motor vehicles licensed under State law for general operation on all public roads within the State.

Roads Open to All Vehicles:

These roads are open to all motor vehicles, including smaller of highway vehicles that may not be licensed for highway use (but not to oversized or overweight vehicles under State traffic law).

Trails Open to All Vehicles:

These trails are open to all motor vehicles, including both highway legal and nonhighway legal vehicles.

Trails Open to Motorcycles Only:

These trails are open only to motorcycles. Siders are not permitted.

Special Road Or Trail Vehicle Designation:

These roads or trails are open only to motor vehicles less than 62 inches in width at the widest point on the vehicle.

Seasonal Designation:

This symbol is used in conjunction with one of the other road or trail symbols, indicates that the road or trail is open only during certain portions of the year. Refer to Seasonal Table for further restrictions.

Dispersed Camping:

- Dispersed Camping, Both Sides
- Dispersed Camping, Left Side
- Dispersed Camping, Right Side

This symbol is used along with a designated road or trail to indicate limited cross-country motor vehicle use within a specific distance of that road, solely for the purpose of dispersed camping. The dots indicate where this dispersed camping is allowed. They may be on the left, right, or both sides of the route. Refer to the Dispersed Camping Table for specifics.

Other Public Roads:

- Interstate
- Highways, US, State
- Other Public Roads

These symbols are used to show routes the Forest Service does not have jurisdiction over, but has not designated for motorized use. These symbols are part of the reference layers showing connections to towns and cities outside the forest boundary.

Motorized Trail Access:

This symbol indicates a trailhead for access to a motorized route. Not all motorized routes have trailheads and those that do may range from primitive to developed.

Short Route Identifier:

This symbol is used for roads that are too short to show a symbol type on the map. The symbol contains the number of the road or trail. Users should refer to the corresponding number in the Short Route Table for designation information.

Areas Open to Cross-Country Travel:

These are areas on National Forest System land that allow cross-country travel by motorized vehicles.

Camping and/or Campfire Restrictions:

These are areas on National Forest System land where camping and/or campfires are prohibited. See the Coconino National Forest website for additional information on these Forest Orders.

Special Notices

1. Areas open to Cross-Country Motorized Uses - The Cinder Hills OHV Area (located on the North Half of the MVUM) is open to all motor vehicles year-round. There are no other areas on the Forest with this designation.

2. Camping - Motor vehicle use for the purpose of dispersed camping is permitted only on National Forest System lands within 300 feet of the edge of road segments designated for dispersed camping. Visitors may park along the edge of any road shown on this map, and walk to dispersed campsites at any location on National Forest System lands, except where specifically prohibited. Prohibited locations include those within the limits of Flagstaff and Sedona, along Oak Creek Canyon, and within the Pumphouse Wash Closure areas within Kachina Village. Remember to park vehicles just off the traveled portion of roadways to permit the safe passage of through traffic.


3. Elk removal - When an elk has been legally taken in Game Management Units SA, BB, TC, TW, and 8, the individual who legally took the animal may drive, or be driven to, the downed elk. Under no circumstances may a second vehicle be used to retrieve the animal. The vehicle used to retrieve the elk may be operated off of designated routes on non-wilderness National Forest System lands up to one mile from designated routes in areas not closed to motor vehicle use under Forest Closure Orders and in a manner that does not result in unacceptable resource damage under 36 CFR Part 201. 4. Roads in developed campgrounds and other developed areas - All roads in developed campgrounds and other developed areas are open to all motor vehicles only. Other developed sites, such as surface parking areas, developed trailhead campsites (including ground surfacing and signage), and trailheads may be accessed by vehicles even when not shown on this map.

5. Sensitive areas - Motor vehicle use off of a forest road or trail for purposes of camping or game retrieval shall not cross riparian areas, streams, and rivers except at hardened crossings with existing culverts. Motor vehicle use off of a forest road or trail may not occur in areas that are gated or closed to motor vehicles, and signed as closed even if shown as designated on the map.

6. Casner Mountain Trail - Casner Mountain Trail (Trail No. 9) is designated as a motorized trail with very rugged conditions along a narrow ridge with limited opportunity for winter travel. For vehicles < 62" in width, the ridge is open year-round and no permit is required; there is room to go around the ridge from both directions. For vehicles > 62" in width, few permits are available from the Red Rock Ranger District from mid-March through mid-May. Permits cost more than one permit will be issued per calendar week.

7. Designated roads are subject to wet weather or winter road closures, or may be temporarily closed due to project-related work, emergency activities, or firefighting operations. Winter weather closures generally occur in higher elevations starting with the first substantial snowfall in late December and can last until mid-April. Please check the Coconino National Forest website for the latest information about status of roads.
