



**FOREST ORDER No. 14-20-04**  
**USDA FOREST SERVICE**  
**PACIFIC SOUTHWEST REGION**  
**Shasta-Trinity National Forest**

Pursuant to 16 USC 551 and 36 CFR 261.50(a), and to protect natural resources and provide for public safety, the following acts are prohibited on the Shasta-Trinity National Forest. This Order is effective from May 30, 2020, through December 31, 2020.

1. Building, maintaining, attending or using a fire, campfire, or stove fire, except in the areas listed below.
  - a. Within a Developed Recreation Site;
  - b. Within 10 feet of Shasta Lake, Trinity Lake, and Iron Canyon Reservoir, provided that the area is at least 50 feet from any vegetation;
  - c. Within the Yolla Bolly-Middle Eel Wilderness Area, Chancelulla Wilderness Area, Castle Crags Wilderness Area, and Mt. Shasta Wilderness Area; and
  - d. Within the Trinity Alps Wilderness Area, except within the Canyon Creek and Stuart Fork Watershed Prohibition Area or the Alpine Lake Watershed Prohibition Area, as described on Exhibit A and shown on Exhibit B.

36 CFR 261.52(a).

2. Smoking, except within an enclosed vehicle or building, or while stopped in an area at least three feet in diameter that is barren or cleared of all flammable material.

36 CFR 261.52(d).

3. Operating an internal combustion engine off paved, gravel or dirt National Forest System roads and trails, except boats on a water surface. 36 CFR 261.52(h).

Pursuant to 36 CFR 216.50(e), the following persons are exempt from this Order:

1. Any Federal, State or local officer, or member of an organized rescue or fire fighting force in the performance of an official duty.
2. Persons with a valid California Campfire Permit are not exempt from the prohibitions listed above. However, persons with a valid California Campfire Permit may use a portable campfire ring/pit, stove, or lantern in an area at least five feet from any flammable materials provided that the portable campfire ring/pit, stove, or lantern only burns gas, kerosene, jellied petroleum or pressurized liquid fuel, with a shut-off valve.



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3. Persons with a valid 2020 Forest Products Removal Permit (fuelwood permit) from the United States Forest Service are not exempt from the prohibitions listed above, but may operate an internal combustion engine off National Forest System roads and trails only to the extent necessary to cut fuelwood, provided the cutting of fuelwood is done in compliance with the terms of the Permit.
4. Persons with a Forest Service non-special-use written authorization to conduct non-recreational activities, such as harvesting timber or forest products, or grazing livestock, are exempt from Prohibition No. 3, provided the activity is done in compliance with the terms of the authorization.

These prohibitions are in addition to the general prohibitions contained in 36 CFR Part 261, Subpart A.

A violation of these prohibitions is punishable by a fine of not more than \$5,000 for an individual or \$10,000 for an organization, or imprisonment for not more than 6 months, or both. 16 USC 551 and 18 USC 3559, 3571, and 3581.

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


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Exhibit A

- a. The boundary of the Canyon Creek and Stuart Fork Watershed Prohibition Area begins at the northwest corner of Section 8, Township 36 North, Range 10 West, Mt. Diablo Base and Meridian, then continues east along the section line to its intersection with the southwest corner of Section 4, then continues due north for  $\frac{1}{4}$  mile, then continues due east to its intersection with the western boundary of Section 3, then continues south along the western edge of Section 3 to its intersection with the southwestern corner of Section 3, then continues east along the southern edge of Section 3 to its intersection with the midpoint of the southern edge of the section, then continues southerly and follows the midpoints of Sections 10 and 15 to its intersection with the midpoint of the southern edge of Section 15, then continues east along the northern edge of Section 22 to its intersection with the northern midpoint of Section 23, then continues due south to its intersection with the midpoint of the southern edge of Section 23, then continues due west to its intersection with the midpoint of the northern edge of Section 28, then continues due south to its intersection with the midpoint of the southern edge of Section 28, then continues due west to its intersection with the northwest corner of Section 33, then continues due south to the midpoint of the eastern edge of Section 32, then continues due west to its intersection with the center of Section 31, then continues due north to its intersection with the southern edge of Section 7, then continues due east to its intersection with the southeast corner of Section 7, then continues due north back to the starting point.
  
- b. The boundary of the Alpine Lake Watershed Prohibition Area begins at the center of Section 27, Township 36 North, Range 10 West, Mt. Diablo Base and Meridian, then continues due east to its intersection with the center of Section 26, then continues due south to its intersection with the center of Section 35, then continues due west to its intersection with the center of Section 34, then continues due north back to the starting point.

#### ***Don't let your campfires escape!***

- 1. Clear all flammable material away from the fire for a minimum of five feet in all directions to prevent escape of the fire.*
- 2. Have a shovel available at the campfire site for preparing and extinguishing campfires.*
- 3. Have a responsible person in attendance at all times.*
- 4. Extinguish campfire with water using the drown, stir and feel method; recommend at least 5 gallons of water.*
