


2020 SMNRA Prospectus Management Areas








2020 SMNRA Prospectus Roads and Trails



VISITOR INFORMATION

TIPS FOR A GREAT VISIT

PICNICS AND CAMPING. For campsite or large group picnic area, reservations, please visit www.recreation.gov or call 877-444-6777 . If you choose to picnic outside of the developed areas make sure you are not on private property. Leave no trash or food behind.

CAMPFIRES ALLOWED IN DEVELOPED CAMPGROUNDS. Fires must be in a **campground fire ring**. Please check with the Visitor Center for current status and further regulations.

PETS—KEEP THEM ON A LEASH. Pets must be on a leash in developed sites such as campgrounds and picnic areas. On trails, it is safer to keep pets leashed to avoid contact with other animals and hikers. And of course, please clean up after your pets.

BE COURTEOUS. Please be considerate of fellow visitors so that everyone has a great experience. While hiking, you may see horseback riders and mountain bikers. Motorized vehicles are prohibited on some trails , please ask the visitor center for details.

CELL PHONES—LIMITED RECEPTION. Much of Lee Canyon has no reception. Reception in Kyle canyon is limited.

DRINKING WATER—LIMITED AVAILABILITY. The Visitor Center, some developed campgrounds and most picnic areas have drinking water from Memorial Day to Labor Day. Don't drink untreated water from streams or springs.

TRASH—FIND A DUMPSTER OR TAKE IT HOME. Dumpsters are located only at the Visitor Center and developed camping and picnic areas. If you can't get to a dumpster, please take trash back home.

TOILETS. Toilets are available at the Visitor Center and developed camping and picnic areas. If you are unable to find a toilet, dig a hole to bury toilet paper and human waste. Cover and disguise the hole when finished.

DEHYDRATION AND HEAT STRESS. Drink plenty of water, wear sunscreen and a hat.

HYPOTHERMIA—TAKE A JACKET. Hypothermia is possible even in mid-summer at cooler high elevations. Bring extra clothes to stay warm and dry.

BE AWARE OF WILDERNESS AREAS. Watch for wilderness boundary signs so you'll know when you've entered the wilderness area. Motorized vehicle use, bicycles, mechanized equipment, and geocaching are not allowed in the wilderness areas.

DON'T ERASE THE TRACES OF AMERICA'S PAST. Archaeological and historic sites hold clues to America's past. If disturbed, a part of our heritage may be lost forever. Historic sites and artifacts on federal lands are protected by federal law. If you discover such remains, please leave them undisturbed.

The Spring Mountains rise up out of the Mojave Desert to provide a forested, spring fed oasis that offers a haven for wildlife, a cool retreat for visitors, a sacred area for Native people and a vital watershed fed by many springs.

These "sky islands" support seven diverse life zones with a wide variety of plants and wildlife including 26 species not found anywhere else in the world. The higher elevations are dominated by Bristlecone pines, which are possibly the world's oldest living organisms.

The Nuwuvi (Southern Paiute) people, whose traditional territory included area around the mountains, consider the Spring Mountains their creation place. They think of the mountains as powerful yet delicate, and to sustain this balance Nuwuvi treat all beings with the utmost respect. We can all continue honoring that tradition by caring for this fragile environment.



Pay phone is located across from Lee Meadows or Mt Charleston Fire Station.</p> <p>There are no gas stations. OPERATOR RESPONSIBILITIES

Operating a motor vehicle on National Forest System roads, National Forest System trails, and in areas on National Forest System lands carries a greater responsibility than operating that vehicle in a city or other developed setting. Not only must you know and follow all applicable traffic laws, you need to show concern for the environment as well as other forest users. The misuse of motor vehicles can lead to the temporary or permanent closure of any designated road, trail, or area. As a motor vehicle operator, you are also subject to State traffic law, including State requirements for licensing, registration, and operation of the vehicle in question.

Motor vehicle use, especially off-highway vehicle use, involves inherent risks that may cause property damage, serious injury, and possibly death to participants. Drive cautiously and anticipate rough surfaces and features, such as snow, mud, vegetation, and water crossings common to remote driving conditions. By your participation, you voluntarily assume full responsibility for these damages, risks, and dangers. Take care at all times to protect yourself and those under your responsibility.

Much of the Spring Mountains National Recreation Area is remote. Medical assistance may not be readily available. Cellular telephones do not work in many areas of the Spring Mountains National Recreation Area. Take adequate food, water, first-aid supplies, and other equipment appropriate for the conditions and expected weather.

ALWAYS REMEMBER TO RESPECT PRIVATE LAND! PROTECT YOUR PRIVILEGE. STAY ON DESIGNATED ROADS AND TRAILS AND IN DESIGNATED AREAS.

Read and understand this map in its entirety. If you have questions please contact the Spring Mountains National Recreation Area for clarification.

As a motor vehicle operator on a National Forest System road, trail, or area, you must comply with this map, as well as all Federal, State, and local laws and regulations. Compliance with these rules is your responsibility.

PROHIBITIONS

It is prohibited to possess or operate a motor vehicle on National Forest System lands on the Spring Mountains National Recreation Area other than in accordance with these designations (36 CFR 261.13).

Violators of 36 CFR 261.13 are subject to a fine of up to \$5,000, imprisonment for up to 6 months, or both (18 U.S.C. 3571(e)). This prohibition applies regardless of the presence or absence of signs.

This map does not display nonmotorized uses, over-snow uses, or other facilities and attractions on the Spring Mountains National Recreation Area. Obtain forest visitor information from the local national forest office.

Designated roads, trails, and areas may also be subject to temporary, emergency closures. As a visitor, you must comply with signs notifying you of such restrictions. A national forest may issue an order to close a road, trail, or area on a temporary basis to protect the life, health or safety of forest visitors or the natural or cultural resources in these areas. Such a temporary and/or emergency closure are consistent with the Travel Management Rule (36 CFR 212.52 (b), 36 CFR 261 subpart B).

The designation "road or trail open to all motor vehicles" does not supersede State traffic law.

PURPOSE AND CONTENTS OF THIS MAP

The designations shown on this motor vehicle use map (MVUM) were made by the responsible official pursuant to 36 CFR 212.51; are effective as of the date on the front cover of this MVUM; and will remain in effect until superseded by next year's MVUM.

It is the responsibility of the user to acquire the current MVUM. This map shows the National Forest System roads, National Forest System trails, and the areas on National Forest System lands in the Spring Mountains National Recreation Area that are designated for motor vehicle use pursuant to 36 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) 212.51. This MVUM also identifies the vehicle classes allowed on each route and in each area; and any seasonal restrictions that apply on those routes and in those areas.

Designation of a road, trail, or area for motor vehicle use by a particular class of vehicle under 36 CFR 212.51 should not be interpreted as encouraging or inviting use or implying that the road, trail, or area is passable, actively maintained, or safe for travel. Motor vehicle designations include parking along designated routes and at facilities associated with designated routes when it is safe to do so and when not causing damage to National Forest System resources. Seasonal weather conditions and natural events may render designated roads and trails impassable for extended periods. Designated areas may contain dangerous or impassable terrain. Many designated roads and trails may be passable only by high-clearance vehicles or four-wheel-drive vehicles. Maintenance of designated roads and trails will depend on available resources, and many may receive little maintenance.

EXPLANATION OF LEGEND ITEMS

Roads Open to Highway Legal Vehicles Only:
These roads are open only to motor vehicles licensed under State law for general operation on all public roads within the State.
Roads Open to All Vehicles:
These roads are open to all motor vehicles, including smaller off-highway vehicles that may not be licensed for highway use (but not to oversize or overweight vehicles under State traffic law).
Trails Open to All Vehicles:
These trails are open to all motor vehicles, including both highway legal and nonhighway legal vehicles.
Trails Open to Vehicles 50" or Less in Width:
These trails are open only to motor vehicles less than 50 inches in width at the widest point on the vehicle.
Other Public Roads and Trails:
Interstate
Highways, U.S., State
Other Public Roads

These symbols are used to show routes the Forest Service does not have jurisdiction over and has not designated for motorized use. These symbols are part of the reference layers showing connections to towns and cities outside the forest boundary.

Short Route Identifier:
70333

This symbol is used for routes that are too short to show an actual symbol type on the map. The symbol contains the number of the road or trail. Users should refer to the corresponding number in the Short Route Table for designation information.

All roads within developed campgrounds and picnic areas are open to highway legal vehicles only.








