All the Bewick's Wrens that I have been able to identify to subspecies in the past have been the Eastern Bewick's Wren with the red back. This subspecies is almost extinct with no birds known to be existing in the eastern U.S. anymore and just a handful hanging on in the Ozarks. The bird we had we only heard and I can only speculate it was probably an Eastern subspecies. I had two Eastern subspecies last winter. Duck variety is on the increase and wader numbers are getting low. It was interesting to see a couple juvenile soras out on the open lake walking around on the lilypads like gallinules. Red Slough Bird Survey – September 28, 2021

It was partly cloudy, warm, and a little windy today on the bird survey. 51 species were found. The biggest highlight today were the Wood Storks. Early in the morning several birds were seen flying low from east to west over Red Slough. Around 10 a.m. large high flying flocks of Black Vultures starting passing over migrating south. As they caught thermals and started circling I noticed a few hawks mixed in with them. As I started scanning through the group looking for hawks I found a group of 6 Wood Storks mixed in with them along with a few Broad-winged Hawks. After they passed to the south another large group of Black Vultures came over and in this group were 9 Wood Storks and a single Anhinga. As high as these birds were I would guess they were coming from the Little River NWR about 15 miles to the north of us. And later in the day as I was leaving the reservoirs and approaching the north parking lot, I flushed from the barrow area around 30 Wood Storks which were joined by several other birds getting up from nearby areas in unit 27A. The morning flight out of the heronry is getting smaller every week now as birds are leaving to migrate south. There was still one pair of White Ibis coming and going from the heronry apparently still feeding young birds. Also, I witnessed an adult Bald Eagle catch a small egret species in the air on the backside of the heronry. Black-bellied Whistling Ducks are staging on Pintail Lake but not in the numbers I have seen in past years but that may change as we still have a few more weeks before they usually leave. Red Slough Bird Survey – July 22, 2021

It was clear turning partly cloudy, hot, with a very slight wind on the bird survey today. 42 species were found. Once again I got caught up trying to count all the water birds and waders on the reservoirs and in the heronry and ended up neglecting the Passerines. By the time I finished with the reservoirs and heronry it was so hot the Passerines were scarce and silent. An out of the ordinary highlight today were 3 Wood Storks; two soaring high over unit 16 with Anhingas and vultures and one sitting in a dead snag on unit 15. Lots of waders are finishing up with their nesting now and dispersing. Great Egret numbers have really dropped. White Ibis numbers have dropped too but most of them are not nesting. I only found 4 White Ibis nest this year and I can no longer relocate them. But there is a large area in the center of the heronry that is difficult to view so there may still be some nesting. There were certainly

Red Slough Bird Survey – July 13, 2021

RJ Baltierra (WA) and I surveyed birds today at Red Slough and found 53 species. The weather was mostly clear starting off calm and mild but turning hot and windy by afternoon. We got there early and caught the morning flight from the heronry. Unfortunately I am only able to count birds leaving the heronry on the east and south sides of the heronry and I am not able to count the ones leaving on the north and west sides. But I am covering the sides with the largest number of birds exiting. Great Egret numbers were noticeably down as well as White Ibis numbers. We surveyed the backside of the heronry as well. Lots of young in the nests of all species in the heronry. Many young starting to fledge. In spite of the large numbers of White Ibis using the Pintail Lake heronry for a roost, I have only seen 4 White Ibis nests in my scans of the heronry. There is another heronry that has started up (about a month ago) in unit 27B in groupings of large buttonbushes. Several hundred birds present with young already in the nests. This area was a Green Heron rookery but Little-blue Herons, Snowy Egrets, and Cattle Egrets have taken the site over for themselves. Due to the time involved in counting the large numbers of heronry birds and the large numbers of gallinules on the reservoirs, the Passerines were mostly neglected again. Next week I will try and put more emphasis on counting Passerines, especially woodland species, but it is so tempting to spend most of the time at the reservoirs looking through the sheer numbers of birds there and hoping for storks, spoonbills, and maybe another Limpkin. Red Slough Bird Survey – June 29, 2021

Erich Massad (OK) and I surveyed birds today at Red Slough and found 57 species. It started off partly cloudy (early) with a light wind, then turning overcast with fairly dense fog, but clearing off to partly cloudy by mid-day. We only caught the last half of the morning flight out of the heronry and we never made it to the backside of the reservoirs to survey the backside of the heronry so wader numbers are lower than usual, especially for Great Egrets (they leave the heronry very early) and Little-blue Herons

(they are mainly nesting on the backside of the heronry.). The dense fog didn't help the survey either. Of note today was an alternate plumaged Black Tern. We will get Black Terns on rare occasions in summer but never had one in alternate plumage before. Lots of broods of both gallinule species everywhere we looked. I found a Least Bittern sitting on a nest in a clump of cattails. She was standing in the nest in typical bittern pose with her head and neck pointing straight up. I could see eggs in the nest. I also found a Purple Gallinule nest several feet above the water in a buttonbush that contained both newly hatched young and eggs. Here is our list for yesterday:

Red Slough Bird Survey – June 3, 2021

It was overcast, cool, and windy on the survey today turning partly cloudy, warm, and windier in the afternoon. 67 species were found. Instead of catching the morning flight out of the heronry at first light, I decided to work the woodlands along the north portion of Red Slough road for passerines first. I didn't make it to the reservoirs and heronry until around 10 a.m. so some of my wader and water bird numbers are much lower than they have been on surveys last month. Also, the strong wind caused the gallinules to stay mostly in the thicker cover plus many are now sitting out of sight on nests. I was able to get a new high count on Anhingas by going to the back side of the heronry where I discovered a lot of nesting Anhingas that I can't see from the front side. This also resulted in good numbers of Little-blue Herons. Some Anhingas had young in the nest as well as Little-blue Herons. I also saw probably a dozen immature (Calico) Little-blue Herons sitting on nests. I didn't realize they started breeding before reaching adult plumage. Once I saw an immature plumaged Neotropic Cormorant sitting on a nest a few years ago. Here is my list for today:

All the lakes and wetland units were covered in 2-3 inches of ice except for a large hole of open water in Lotus Lake and one in Bittern Lake that were being kept open by hundreds of waterfowl, coots, and grebes. Passerines were really scarce and hard to come by. I hope most of the missing birds had been smart enough to migrate further south rather than freezing to death. There were numerous dead coots laying around and a few grebe carcasses frozen in the ice. And I also found one Brown Thrasher laying on the ground dead. I witnessed a Northern Harrier land on a dead coot out on the ice and scavenge on it. I saw a Virginia Rail out walking on the snow on one of the levees, then it ran into the marshy ice covered ditch when I approached. Notable finds today included a King Rail and a Rusty Blackbird (very scarce this year.).
