- Passerine
 - AKA song birds or perching birds (A large group of birds; groups shown on next slide)



Behavior - Flight Patterns

Soaring: Hawks and Eagles

Straight and Fast: Mourning Doves

Undulating: Woodpeckers

Hovering: Kingfishers and Hummingbirds

Dabbler Ducks: spring directly into flight

Diving Ducks: need running takeoff





Behavior – Signature Moves

- Flycatcher: dart from perch, snatch insect, return to perch
- Woodpecker: jerk as they climb tree; use tail to brace themselves
- Creepers: climb trees in spirals
- Nuthatches: Climb down trees headfirst
- Swifts and swallows: Great aerialists for catching insects
- Hummers: Males have intricate courtship display
- Doves: bob their heads while walking
- Sapsuckers: drills evenly spaced holes in trees and then later eats insects caught in sap
- Towhees: scratch with both feet in leaves on the ground
- Waxwings: gorge themselves on abundant berries, then are unable to fly
- Kinglets- crazy fast foraging flittering here and there, hardly pausing in one place



Songs vs. Calls – What's the difference?

- Songs
 - Usually by males only to:
 - Attract mate
 - Claim a territory
 - Usually only during the breeding season
 - Usually numerous notes put together
 - Sometimes are described using a mnemonic

- Calls
 - Used by both sexes to maintain contact or express alarm
 - Any time of year
 - Usually one or a few notes put together
 - Common descriptors:
 - Chirp, chuck, chip, chink
 - Peek, pick,
 - Whit
 - Eek
 - Tseet, tseep, zee,tsip, tsick

Those that say their name:

- Mountain Chickadee: "Chick-a-dee-dee"
- Killdeer: "Killdeer, killdeer, killdeer"
- O Poorwill: "Poor-will, poor-will, poor-will"

Those that say other things:


- O Quail: "Chi-ca-go"
- Great Horned Owl: "Who's awake? Me too."
- Robin: "Cheerily, cheer-up, cheerily"
- Bell's Vireo: "What about me? What about you!"
- Yellow throat: "Witchety, witchety"
- Olive-sided flycatcher: "Quick! Three beers please."
- Rufous-sided Towhee: "Drink your tea-e-a-a"
- And many others....












Birds of Prey Silhouettes






Rounded: Blue Jay

Deeply forked: Barn Swallow











White band at tip- Kingbirds

Spectacles: eye rings with line across beak

• Eye ring: ring around eye (American Robin)







Cap: color on top of head (Gila Woodpecker)





Hood: color on head extends to nape (Hooded Oriole)







Bib: color from throat to chest (Swainson's

Hawk)







Mask: color around eyes (Cardinal, Abert's towhee)
