It was mostly clear, brutally hot (heat index of 110+), with a slight wind on the bird survey today. 53 species were found. Very little singing was heard today and Passerines were scarce. I started in the dark around 5:00 a.m. hoping for some nightjars and owls but only found one owl and some bats. Caught the morning flight out of the heronry but numbers were down on ibis', Great Egrets and Little-blue Herons. No storks this week. The big highlight of the day was finding **4 Limpkins** feeding together on Push Creek. Also got to see a Purple Gallinule karate kick a Cattle Egret in the chest with both feet when it landed to close to its young and sent it flying away. Also, if you want to see Least Bitterns and King Rails, the observation platform/photo blind on Pintail Lake is the place to be early in the morning. Got great close-up looks at both species. The King Rail crossed the gravel road by the platform a couple times with pauses and a Least Bittern was putting on a show in the cattails next to the platform. Here is my list for today:

Red Slough Bird Survey – May 23, 2022

It was overcast, cool, and windy all morning, turning partly cloudy and warm in the afternoon, on the bird survey today. I started off wearing two shirts and a jacket and running the heater and ended up with wearing one t-shirt and running the AC by the end of the survey. 67 species were found. Best highlights were two Limpkins and a Roseate Spoonbill. Both Limpkins are mainly hanging out in Push Creek now that they have discovered a wealth of mussels there. I watched one for a good while today and he found lots of mussels and ate them. The mussels must have been thick as it would only take him about 30 seconds after eating one mussel to find another one. He was very tame and allowed me to stand fairly close to him and take photos while he fed. The spoonbill circled over the heronry in Pintail Lake a couple times then did a flyover of the heronry in Otter Lake then flew south and I lost it. Normally when I catch the morning flight from the heronries I set up on the Lotus Lake observation platform. But last week I noticed there were a lot more birds flying past the Pintail Lake observation platform coming from the new heronry on Otter Lake so I set up there this morning around first light. While trying to count the hundreds of birds streaming past me in the near dark a flock of seven Common Nighthawks started feeding right beside me over the levee. They were flying by my head fairly close and some were below me and they continued this for about 15-20 minutes. Common Nighthawks have always been rare at Red Slough and have been declining all over this region so I was thrilled to see

them and feeding so close to me. They were making clicking noises as they fed. And if that wasn't enough to distract me from counting the heronry birds that were streaming past, 4 Least Bitterns starting calling and flying back and forth in the cattails in front of the platform and a pair of King Rails were prancing around on the white graveled levy road on the other side of the platform. The King Rails really put on a show probably staying visible for 20 minutes. Also, Black-bellied Whistling Ducks kept buzzing the platform and one almost landed on it with me there. It is a favorite perching spot for them. A birder from New York (Scott Peterson), came by and I showed him his Lifer King Rail and Lifer Purple Gallinule. Checking his ebird report I see that he had a Limpkin near the middle parking lot and he left the area around 10:13. I had my first Limpkin sighting today around noonish on Push Creek on the south side of Lotus Lake which is over a mile upstream from the Limpkin Scott found.. When I left I stopped by the middle parking area and saw a Limpkin there too, not knowing about Scotts finding it. This is also the location that someone reported a Limpkin yesterday. So with this info I was able to determine that there were two Limpkins which I have been suspecting as we have flight shots of Limpkins four days apart showing different molt sequences in the wings. I observed and photographed him at close range for about half an hour and observed that he was feeding on Ramshorn snails. Also of special note was a male Canada Warbler in "Warbler Alley". I caught the morning flight this morning which starts about 5:45 a.m. Herons and egrets have started nest building. Neotropic Cormorants and Anhingas are already sitting on nests. There is a tremendous number of White Ibis roosting in the heronry at night.
