PURPOSE AND CONTENTS OF THIS MAP

The designations shown on this over-snow vehicle use map (OSVUM) were made by the responsible official pursuant to 36 CFR 212.80; are effective as of the date on the front cover of this OSVUM; and will remain in effect until superseded by the next version generated by this Unit

Forest Supervisor, Stanislaus National Forest

It is the responsibility of the user to acquire the current OSVUM. This OSVUM shows the areas on National Forest System lands in the Stanislaus National Forest that are designated for over-snow motor vehicle use pursuant to 36 CFR 212.80. This OSVUM also identifies seasonal estrictions that apply on those trails and in those areas. Designation of a trail or area for over-snow motor

vehicle use by a particular class of vehicle under 36 CFR 212.80 should not be interpreted as encouraging or inviting use or implying that the trail or area is passable, actively maintained, or safe for travel. Seasonal weather conditions and natural events may render designated trails impassable for extended periods. Designated areas may contain dangerous or impassable terrain including areas prone to avalanches. Be avalanche aware.

This over-snow vehicle use map identifies those trails and areas designated for the over-snow vehicle use under 36 CFR 212.80, Subpart C for the purpose of enforcing the prohibition at 36 CFR 261.14. This is a limited purpose. The other public roads and access roads are shown for information and navigation purposes only. Over-snow vehicle use not in accordance with the designated trails and areas displayed on this over-snow vehicle use map is prohibited by 36 CFR 261.14. Over-snow vehicle use off

EXPLANATION OF LEGEND ITEMS

Designated Cross-County Over-Snow Vehicle Use Areas:

These are areas on National Forest System land that are open for cross-country over-snow vehicle travel by vehicles designed specifically for that purpose, where 12 inch minimum snow depth requirements are met and no contact is made with native soil or vegetation.

These are areas on National Forest System land that are open for cross-country over-snow vehicle travel by vehicles designed specifically for that purpose, where 24 inch minimum snow depth requirements are met and no contact is made with native soil or vegetation.

These are areas on National Forest System land that have a specific season of use defined. Refer to the Special Designation Table for further instructions.

Designated Over-Snow Vehicle Use Trails:

■ ■ ■ ■ These trails are open to all over-snow vehicles and may be groomed when funding is available and the 12 inch minimum snow depth requirement and no contact with bare minimal soil is met. Funding is determined annually. Please contact the forest for groomed status. These trails have labels

These ungroomed trails are open to all over-snow vehicles when the 12 inch minimum snow depth requirement and no contact with bare minimal soil is met.

Non-Jurisdictional Over-Snow Vehicle Use Trails: The Forest Service does not have jurisdiction over the non-jurisdictional over-snow vehicle use trails. Therefore, access, availability and use of these non-jurisdictional over-snow vehicle use trails are subject to change outside the authority of this OSVUM. Displaying these non-jurisdictional over-snow vehicle use trails on this map are for public

convenience only. = = = = These trails are commonly groomed over-snow vehicle trails located over non-jurisdictional travel routes (e.g., state and county roads). Grooming funding is determined annually. Please contact the forest for updates on groomed status of non-jurisdictional over-snow vehicle trails.

= = = : Ungroomed non-jurisdictional trails are located over non-jurisdictional travel routes (e.g., state and county roads). These trails are not likely to be groomed.

A SNO-PARK permit is required for each vehicle parked at a SNO-PARK site from November 1 through May 30 of each year. Permits are sold as Day Permits or Seasonal Permits.

This symbol indicates a winter creek crossing.


Alpha Character Designation Symbol:

Over-snow vehicle use may occur in this area after that date as long as the 12 inch minimum snow depth requirement is met and no contact is made with native soil or
