


# Campgrounds

All campsites have picnic tables, fire rings and vault toilets.

#### Juanita Lake

Located 6 miles west of the Goosenest Ranger District Office. From Highway 97 take Ball Mtn. Rd. to Forest Road 46N04. This leads to the lake which is at the 5,100 foot elevation. Juanita Lake offers a unique combination of recreation opportunities.


#### Fishing:



The 55 acre lake is regularly stocked with rainbow and brown trout and has a bass and catfish population. There are no motors allowed on the lake. However, its size makes it excellent for small rowboats, rafts or canoes. There are two fishing jetties that provide easy access to the lake. Some people with physical disabilities may have difficulties and require assistance from others.

#### Hiking:

There is a 1.5 mile paved, barrier free trail that circles Juanita Lake. For the more ambitious hiker, there is a 6 mile hike with a 2,700 foot elevation climb to Ball Mountain Lookout.

## Winter Use:



Access to the lake is mainly by cross country skis or snowshoes. There is an 11.75 mile (18.8k) long nordic ski trail. The trailhead is located at the junction of

Meiss Lake Road and the north end of Juanita Lake Road. Some track set and grooming is provided.

## Martin's Dairy

Located 15 miles west of the Goosenest Ranger District Office. From Highway 97 take Forest Road 46N12. Turn on 46N09 which leads to the campground. At the 6,000 foot elevation, Martin's Dairy sits adjacent to a mountain meadow and the Little Shasta River. Goosenest Mountain and Willow Creek Mountain border the campground, where the headwaters of the Little Shasta River begin, turns into a moderate sized stream further down the mountain.

Martin's Dairy campground offers opportunities for picnicking, bird watching, photography and fishing. It is a starting point for great mountain biking opportunities. Nearby are Little Shasta Meadow, an old Forest Service guard cabin, quaking aspen groves, and a distant view of Mt. Shasta.

## Fishing:



The Little Shasta River is regularly stocked with trout. Perrywinkles are abundant in this stream and are usually found under rocks in the slower moving water. They are extremely good bait in this stream for catching Rainbow and Brown trout.

## Horse Camp:

Martin's Dairy Horse Camp is located ¼ mile north of the main campground. There are numerous scenic gated dirt roads in the area that can be used as trails.

## Shafter

The campground is located adjacent to Butte Creek, 7 miles east of the Goosenest Ranger District Office.

From Highway 97 turn on Old State Highway. The campground is at the 4,300 foot elevation. During the fall hunting season, the campground fills up quickly.

Shafter is a tranquil campground next to lush meadows containing wildflowers found early in the season. The S.P. railroad tracks go right past the campground, occasionally campers can enjoy the trains as they go by. Butte Creek is regularly stocked with rainbow and brown trout and offers good fishing early in the season.



## We Need Your Help

In these campgrounds, build campfires only in fireplaces provided. Keep your animals on a leash, please use trash bins, and clean fish and wash dishes away from the water hydrants. Play radios and other audio devices at a level that doesn't disturb other campers. Protect your valuables and report any vandalism to your Campground Host.

Most National Forest campers prefer clean camps for their own enjoyment. Think about how clean you would like to find your next campground; this will give you an idea of what needs to be done. Help yourself by helping us keep America's recreation areas clean.
