



**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
**Order Number 19-06-02**  
**USDA Forest Service**  
**Lake Tahoe Basin Management Unit**  
**Camping and Fire Restrictions**

Pursuant to 36 CFR 261.50(a) and (b), the following acts are prohibited within the Lake Tahoe Basin Management Unit. This order is effective from June 21, 2006, through June 21, 2008.

1. Camping except in the locations listed below:
  - a. The fee campgrounds shown on Exhibit 1.
  - b. Designated campsites in the Watson Lake, Blackwood Canyon, Luther, and Buck Lake areas, as shown on Exhibit 1. Designated campsites are marked by a numbered post and a metal campfire ring with a hinged grill.
  - c. Within 300 feet of the Tahoe Rim Trail.
  - d. Within 300 feet of the Pacific Crest National Scenic Trail. However, this exception does not apply on the Pacific Crest National Scenic Trail from its intersection with U.S. Highway 50, north to the boundary of the Desolation Wilderness.
  - e. The Meiss Management area, as shown on Exhibits 1 and 4, and the Mount Rose Wilderness area, as shown on Exhibit 1.
  - f. Within 100 feet of the Genoa Peak Road (Forest Road 14N32) from its intersection with the White Hill Spur Road (Forest Road 14N32A), south to its intersection with Logan House Loop Road (Forest Road 14N33), as shown on Exhibit 3.
  - g. Within 100 feet of the Logan House Loop Road (Forest Road 14N33), as shown on Exhibit 3
  - h. Within 100 feet of the McKinney Rubicon Road (Forest Road 14N34) from the Off-Highway Vehicle staging area, west to the boundary of the Tahoe National Forest, as shown on Exhibit 2.
  - i. The Lost Lake and Duck Lake area, as shown on Exhibit 2

36 CFR 261.58(e).

2. Camping for more than 5 consecutive days in any one of the following areas: Blackwood Canyon, Luther, Watson Lake, and Buck Lake. 36 CFR 261.58(a).

3. Camping for a combined total of more than 14 days in the Blackwood Canyon, Luther, Watson Lake, and Buck Lake areas or in any single fee campground during any calendar year. 36 CFR 261.58(a).

4. Camping for a combined total of more than 14 days during any calendar year in the areas described in prohibition numbers 1.e. through 1.i., above. 36 CFR 261.58(a).

5. Entering or using any fee campground from sunset to sunrise from November 1, 2006, through May 1, 2007, and from November 1, 2007, through May 1, 2008. 36 CFR 261.58(1).
6. Building, maintaining, attending or using a fire, campfire, or charcoal fire. However, a fire is permitted within a fee campground; developed picnic or beach site within a Forest Service provided barbecue; or a designated campsite in the Watson Lake, Blackwood Canyon, Luther, and Buck Lake areas if the fire is contained within a metal campfire ring provided by the Forest Service. A campfire is defined as a fire, not within any building, mobile home, or living accommodation mounted on a motor vehicle, which is used for cooking, personal warmth, lighting, ceremonial, or aesthetic purposes. A charcoal fire is defined as any fire in which the primary fuel is charcoal and which can be contained within a barbecue, hibachi, fire pit, or other container. 36 CFR 261.52(a).

Pursuant to 36 CFR 261.50(e), the following persons are exempt from this order:

1. Persons with a permit from the Forest Service specifically authorizing the otherwise prohibited act or omission. Persons with a valid campfire permit are not exempt from the prohibitions listed above. However, persons with a valid campfire permit may use a portable stove or lantern using gas, jellied petroleum, or pressurized liquid fuel. In addition, persons with a valid campfire permit are exempt from prohibition No. 6 in the areas described in prohibition numbers 1.e. through 1.i., above.
2. Any Federal, State or local officer, or member of an organized rescue or fire fighting force in the performance of an official duty.

These prohibitions are in addition to the general prohibitions in 36 CFR Part 261, Subpart A.

Violation of these prohibitions is punishable by a fine of not more than \$5,000 for an individual or \$10,000 for an organization, or imprisonment for not more than six months, or both.
