

SAGE VALLEY/HORSE VALLEY ALLOTMENT
2009 Annual Operating Instructions

1. PERMITTED & AUTHORIZED USE

Permitted use is the livestock numbers and season of use listed in your grazing permit. **It is not necessarily the numbers and season of use for the current year. Authorized use is the number of livestock and season of use you are authorized for in 2009** (authorized use reflects stocking and/or season of use changes for the given year).

* Livestock will be removed prior to the end of the season if grazing-use standards have been met.

2. PASTURE ROTATIONS

The dates listed below are considered approximate; move dates will be based on the level of livestock use in the grazing unit or area (see grazing-use standards). It is a violation of your term grazing permit for livestock to occupy any pastures or areas other than those scheduled for use according to these instructions. **You are expected to frequently monitor your allotment and notify Brian Monroe immediately if you are unable to keep livestock in the scheduled area; or if you are experiencing any other problems that would prevent you from following these instructions.**

*You are expected to record actual use each year and provide this information to the Forest Officer at the end of the grazing season.

3. GRAZING-USE STANDARDS

***Since sheep prefer forbs and browse, pay particular attention to the use on these species. Practice once-over, light grazing use and rotate bedgrounds/campsites frequently to avoid overusing the same areas each year. Graze the sheep in loose bands and trail, rather than drive, the animals to water.**

When a significant portion of the site, key area, or grazing unit has achieved any one of the three standards, livestock will be removed from the area or grazing unit. The permittee has the responsibility for ensuring that these standards are not exceeded.

4. MONITORING

Permittees must monitor grazing use and independently move livestock when the grazing-use standards described above are met.

5. IMPROVEMENT MAINTENANCE AND LIVESTOCK HERDING

- All assigned improvements **must be adequately maintained prior to placing livestock in the grazing unit.** All allotment boundary fences must be maintained prior to the turn-on date for **Sage Valley/Horse Valley** or any of the adjacent allotments. Permittees in non-use status are still responsible for their proportionate share of maintenance.
- Refer to the **Range Improvement Maintenance and Livestock Herding Standards attached** to these instructions for a description of the Forest Service Maintenance Standard for structural improvements and for livestock herding standards.

6. SCHEDULE OF PROJECTS/ACTIVITIES/SPECIAL CONCERNS FOR 2009

- **Please move the sheep quickly through the powerline area behind Cedar Breaks (on the Six-Lakes/Navajo Ridge Allotment).**
- **Pipeline from Hulet ponds to new pond above (north) of Neley's Flat.**
- **Install perforated pipe at Mitchell Saw Mill Spring.**
- **Plan out pipeline from Mitchell Saw Mill Spring to Sage Valley**
- **Boundary Markers between six lakes**

7. MISCELLANEOUS

- **Your annual grazing bill must be paid and notification received in our office prior to turning livestock onto the Forest. It may take 10 days or more from the time you mail your payment until we receive payment notification so plan accordingly.**
- **Only certified noxious weed free hay and straw is authorized on the Dixie National Forest. All sheep camps will be checked this year for weed free hay. If you do not have *current* documentation of this certification posted at the camp in full view, permit non-compliance actions will be immediately initiated. In addition, hay samples will be randomly taken for weed content analysis.**
- You are expected to comply with the Dixie National Forest Special Order for Roads, Trails, and Areas. **In areas designated as L-2 on the 1998 Dixie National Forest Travel Map, the use of motorized vehicles off of designated roads or trails is prohibited. The Sage Valley portion of the allotment is designated as L2.** Exemptions to this order may be granted in some instances for improvement maintenance or other unique circumstances related to livestock management. Contact Brian Monroe for details regarding this issue.
- **These *Annual Operating Instructions and attachments* are a part of your grazing permit (see item 8a, Part 2). A failure to follow these instructions is a violation of your permit.**
