Fire Science and Basic Wildland Firefighting Skills

Students from Portola HS Fire Science Class learned about what it takes to be a wildland firefighter through participation in a “Basic 32 Wildland Firefighting” course. Firefighters from the Beckwourth Ranger District assisted with classroom instruction and field-based skills training. In the field they learned about equipment, cutting fire line, hose lays, nozzle work (water streams), observing and measuring fire weather, and observation of a prescribed burn. The students applied what they have learned about fire behavior in dense forests and put to test newly acquired firefighting skills, which include fuels reduction and forest thinning. Twenty-two students completed the course, with the highlight of certification and “graduation” at all-student assembly. They will be “fire-ready” if they choose employment in wildland firefighting.

Projects are carefully planned for ecological/fire restoration, age- and grade-appropriateness, and tie to the California State Curriculum and Content Standards. Collaboration provides the opportunity for the Lassen and Plumas National Forests to restore the area and for PUSD to educate students with a hands-on, placed-based approach to learning.

Objectives:

- Provide students with marketable natural resource skills.
- Student participation in design of recreation features and products.
- Provide opportunities for integration of curriculum.
- Teacher learning about natural resource topics.
- Build new relationships and enhance partnerships already in place.
