



Recreation fees are an investment in outdoor recreation. Current and future generations will benefit as 95% of the funds are reinvested in the facilities and services that visitors enjoy, use, and value.

Accomplishments Provided with Recreation Fees:

- Supported volunteers from 27 groups, including inner-city youth crews, who donated 6,850 hours of time and completed various maintenance tasks across the forest.
- Provided field presence and visitor education, monitored campsite conditions, inspected outfitter camps, enforced regulations, mapped and treated noxious weeds, removed trash, maintained trails and posted new trailhead information in Gros Ventre, Teton and Bridger Wilderness areas.
- Leveraged Snake River Fund and Grand Teton Association partnership dollars to provide daily coverage in the Snake River Wild and Scenic River corridor to:
 - Maintain boat ramp facilities, monitor and administer river special use permits, educate visitors about river safety, provide information on how to prevent the spread of aquatic nuisance species and administer group use permits.
 - Process more than 66 free group use permits.
- Expanded field presence and improved dispersed recreation and motor vehicle travel management by:
 - Producing and posting 30 trailhead kiosk signs, improving nine campsites, installing barrier logs and new road gates, adding new route signing, and working with the State of Wyoming to maintain and/or improve 40 miles of motorized trail and enforce Forest regulations.
 - Supplementing a Wyoming State Trails grant to provide law enforcement and increase capability to improve and maintain trails.

Special Feature

Is it possible to get 74 sixth graders outside to enjoy work and play? The 2013 Summer Sampler Program hosted by Systems of Education and Teton 10 in Jackson Wyoming proved it's possible and the kids love it. The Bridger-Teton Children's Forest participated in the program, introducing the kids to, believe it or not, trail maintenance and camp site clean-up.

Additional Bridger-Teton Accomplishments

- Provided visitor assistance, education and enforcement for snowmobilers, cross-country skiers and other winter travelers. This included patrolling heavily used areas with snowmobiles and by skis to explain and enforce winter range closures for wildlife and dog leash requirements and to provide avalanche education.
- Supported volunteers at Hawks Rest and Fox Park patrol cabins in the Teton Wilderness. These volunteers contacted over 350 people and shared information on proper food storage in bear country and leave-no-trace principles. Volunteers also assisted in clearing trails near the cabins.
- Combined recreation fees, grant funds and donations to improve and maintain 800 miles of trail: Cleared 1,533 trees, installed 642 water bars or rolling dips to control erosion and reconstructed 21,975 feet of tread.


