



Recreation fees are an investment in outdoor recreation. Current and future generations will benefit as 95% of the funds are reinvested in the facilities and services that visitors enjoy, use, and value.

Accomplishments Provided with Recreation Fees:

American Fork Canyon-Alpine Loop Recreation Area

- Hired seasonal employees to staff major trailheads and provide visitor information and education and assist with traffic control.
- Supported volunteers who completed routine trail maintenance, installed new fencing, stained kiosks and reseeded barren areas.
- Completed general trail maintenance on over 119 miles of trail.
- Conducted blasting operations to widen trail tread at Grove Creek.
- Finished Ridge Trail reroutes and developed plans for additional reroutes on East Ridge Trail.
- Installed 12 new trail junction signs and various other signs with an emphasis on Lone Peak Wilderness.
- Funded a Wilderness Ranger who offered visitor education and assisted the Timpanogos Emergency Response Team.
- Maintained and operated five picnic areas, two interpretive sites, two fishing sites, seven dispersed group sites, two winter cross-country ski areas and 24 trailheads.
- Fixed water system lines at Cascade Springs and South Fork.
- Removed old and installed new bathroom at Upper Falls Picnic Site.
- Installed three new interpretive kiosks at Silver Lake.
- Issued and administered special use permits for a variety of groups and recreation events.



Employees patrolled front and back country roads to contact and educate visitors about off-highway vehicle use.

Special Feature

One of the forest's most popular hikes takes visitors to the summit of Mount Timpanogos via the scenic Timponeke Trail. In 2013, volunteers assisted with the construction of a new trailhead, which included new interpretive kiosks and benches. Supported with fee funds, these volunteers also completed reroutes of Mill Canyon and South Fork Little Deer Creek trails.

Additional Uinta-Wasatch-Cache Accomplishments

Mirror Lake Scenic Byway

- Partnered with the State of Utah and Wyoming Recreation Trail Funds and groomed a total of 700 miles of trail for cross country skiing, over 90 miles for snowmobile use, and plowed 15 separate parking lots.
- Maintained and supplied five winter yurts a total of 409 nights.
- Completed construction of Whitney Trailhead and improvement projects at Whitney Warming Hut.
- Rerouted one-half mile of Lily Lake Trail to prevent further erosion.
- Completed tasks associated with opening Ruth Lake and Stone Garden Trails for use.
- Removed approximately 300 hazard trees from motorized and non-motorized trails and developed sites and 500 beetle-infested trees in Lost Creek Campground.
- Administered 'Wolverine Ridge Mountain Bike Race' recreation event.
- Offered weekend interpretive programs at Mirror Lake Amphitheater; approximately 210 people attended.
- Staffed information booths daily during the summer.
- Purchased and installed 35 expanded metal picnic tables rated for heavy snow loads.


