OHV Use in Red Canyon


In the Dixie National Forest there are a number of motorized travel routes for 4-wheel driving, ATV, UTV and motorcycle use. Motorized vehicles significantly impact the landscape and wildlife habitat and are only allowed on designated trails. Citations will be issued to those found traveling outside of designated routes.

BARNEY COVE TRAIL Foot, bike, horse, and OHV
1.9 mi (3.1 km) one-way

This is used primarily as a connector between the Casto Canyon Trail and the Fremont Trail.



CASTO CANYON TRAIL Foot, bike, horse, and OHV (fewer than 50 inches wide on designated sections of the trail)
5.5 mi (8.8 km) one-way


With colorful formations and classic canyon scenery, you won't want to miss this one. Motorized vehicles follow the Barney Cove Trail to the Fremont Trail.



FREMONT TRAIL OHV
The Fremont Trail is an OHV system that includes several loop opportunities with on-the-ground signage and a map. Please inquire with the Visitor Center staff regarding questions and plan on several days to see some of the best scenery that southern Utah has to offer.

CAMPING ALONG THE TRAILS

Dispersed camping is allowed within 150 feet of most routes. However, in some parts of the forest, dispersed camping is allowed only in designated campsites. These areas are shown on the Dixie National Forest flyer, *Camping on the East Fork*. Pick up a copy at the Red Canyon Visitor Center. Signs are also posted onsite to help identify the appropriate area.
