

**Campfire Permits are not needed
when camping in developed
campgrounds--only when
dispersed camping.**



This is a guide to where developed campgrounds are located...it is not meant to be a map. You are strongly urged to get a Stanislaus National Forest map should you choose to explore the Forest's beauty in its many remote locations.

Dispersed Camping: Alternative to Campgrounds

Dispersed camping occurs in less-developed areas where no services are provided. There are neither picnic tables, metal fire rings or garbage service, nor are there any designated camping or parking areas provided.

Visitors should plan ahead and bring all of the items they think they will need on their stay. We ask that all visitors remember good outdoor ethics about camping, travel and behavior.

Dispersed camping is not allowed:

- within a mile of Pinecrest Basin
- on Hwy 108 between Clark Fork Road and Kennedy Meadows
- on Clark Fork Road

Campsites

Use existing campsites in lieu of clearing new ones. Although it is natural for campers to want to camp near a water source, please remember to camp at least 100 feet away from creeks, rivers, lakes or the edges of meadows. This helps minimize resource damage to wet areas and disturbance to wildlife.

Keep a clean, neat campsite. Secure food—preferably in airtight containers. Any item with an odor is a potential food source for a wild animal. Litter and garbage are unsightly, unsanitary and harmful to wildlife and fish. Clean dishes 100 feet away from water sources. Place food scraps either in a closed container (to take with you when you depart) or dispose of them in an area that does not invite wild animals.

Human waste disposal is very important. Keep all waste at least 100 feet away from water sources. Dig shallow (minimum 6" depth) "cat holes" to bury human waste. Do not attempt to burn your used toilet paper, but instead pack it out with your garbage.

Campfires

Before leaving for your trip, check with appropriate fire officials (or Forest Service personnel) to learn whether the area you plan to visit has fire restrictions. You will need a campfire permit even if no seasonal fire restrictions are in place.

- Use existing fire rings whenever possible.
- Campfires should never be so large as to singe or burn any vegetation overhead.
- Campfires should be contained within rock fire rings.
- Campfires should be surrounded by an area of 5' clearance in all directions, cleared to the soil.
- Never leave campfires unattended—for any reason. Campfire permits require a shovel and water for extinguishing fires.
- Make sure the fire is dead out.
