# Tonto National Forest 2014 Recreation Fee Proposal

## Introduction

The Tonto National Forest is proposing to modify the existing recreation fee structure in order to continue to operate and maintain its developed recreation sites.

In January, 2013, the Tonto National Forest (TNF) began evaluating the sustainability of the forest's developed recreation program in light of increasing costs to manage and maintain recreation sites, including reducing a growing backlog of deferred facilities maintenance. The TNF began public involvement by hosting eight community open houses with Tonto visitors to discuss present and foreseeable challenges and by partnering with Arizona State University to conduct a Fee Attitude Study inside of its fee-for-use recreation sites. The overall goal was to engage forest users in a discussion about long-term sustainability of the developed recreation program, including management of nearly 200 developed recreation sites, of which 71 of these sites are recreation fee sites managed under the Federal Lands Recreation Enhancement Act (REA), and to better understand visitor attitudes towards paying fees.

From these two engagements, the TNF learned that the majority of the Tonto's recreating visitors tend to be local, living within fifty miles of the forest, visit two to ten times per year, generally do not want a reduction in services, understand the need for a fee program, support paying fees over reductions of services and facilities, and want an onsite pass purchase option.

As a result of these inquiries, the TNF is developing a business strategy for a sustainable developed recreation program, with recreation fees representing just one of the tools to achieve the goals of the strategy. When combined with appropriations, partnerships, and volunteers the TNF will have the opportunity to continue providing recreation opportunities now and in the future.

The TNF proposes the following recreation program fee changes:

1. Eliminate standard amenity recreation fee area designations from six areas, including eliminating the fee for seven (7) developed recreation sites. Retain two (2) Standard Amenity sites, seven (7) Expanded Amenity boat launches, seven (7) Expanded Amenity Family Campgrounds, four (4) Expanded Amenity group campgrounds, and twelve (12) Special Recreation Permit sites (Proposal I).
2. Establish a new fee for an onsite pass purchase option for daily Tonto Pass and Watercraft Sticker. Install fee machines to provide an onsite option to purchase the daily Tonto Pass and Watercraft Sticker. Proposed new onsite fee is \$12 for daily Tonto Pass and \$6 for Watercraft Sticker. (Proposal II)
3. Decrease, Increase, or Eliminate Fees (Proposal III)
  - Decrease the fee for the Tonto Annual Pass to \$80/annually.
  - Increase the daily Tonto Pass fee to \$8/day.
  - Align camping fees in developed campgrounds commensurate with the services provided and cost of management.
  - Align fees in group campgrounds and group picnic areas commensurate with the services provided and cost of management.
  - Eliminate fees at five recreation sites.

## **Public Involvement**

Through the public open houses and the *Fee Attitude Survey*, the TNF engaged its patrons to help gain a better understanding of what visitors want in a developed recreation program. That is, *TNF visitors generally do not want a reduction in recreation services*. The Tonto has considered over 300 open ended comments and the statistical results of the *Fee Attitude Survey* in the development of this proposal.

The TNF is seeking public comment on the proposed changes and plans to submit the proposal to the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) Arizona Recreation Resource Advisory Council (R-RAC) in the fall/winter of 2014. The following public participation tasks will be completed:

- Post onsite notices at the affected recreation fee sites;
- Distribute a press release to local media contacts;
- Post proposal and supporting documents on the Tonto National Forest website;
- Establish mobile information stations at approximately six recreation fee sites. This would include setting up an EZ-Up within selected recreation sites and making contacts with fee site users. District recreation staff will be available to provide information about the fee proposal and answer questions. The public will have an opportunity to provide comments onsite or will be provided information on how to submit comments;
- Brief local and federal elected officials;
- Contact local Chambers of Commerce and recreation interest groups; and
- Present proposal to the BLM Arizona Recreation Resource Advisory Council.

## Proposed Changes to Fee Program

### Proposal I: Eliminate Standard Amenity Recreation Fee Areas and Retain Fees at Stand-alone Standard Amenity Fee (SAF) and Expanded Amenity Fee (EAF) sites, and Special Recreation Permit (SRP) shoreline locations.

#### Proposed Changes to Recreation Sites and Areas

- Remove Standard Amenity Recreation Fee Area designation from the six areas: Apache Lake, Roosevelt Lake, Seven Springs, Bartlett Lake, Upper Verde (Horseshoe), and Lower Verde (Needle Rock). See Appendix A for maps of the standard amenity recreation fee areas.
- Retain 2 SAF sites (Rattlesnake Cove, Needle Rock). Each of the SAF sites has the six amenities required under REA, including designated developed parking, toilet facility, trash, interpretive sign, picnic table, and security services. See Appendix C for the list of SAF sites and amenities.
- Retain 7 EAF sites (highly developed boat launches), including Jojoba, Yellow Cliffs, Cholla, Grapevine, Schoolhouse, Windy Hill, and Burnt Corral. Each of the EAF sites is a highly developed boat launch with specialized facilities or services. See Appendix C for the list of EAF boat launches and specialized facilities and services.
- Eliminate fees at seven recreation sites (Table 1). These seven sites will be free and remain open to the public
- Fee type change from SAF to SRP for 12 shoreline areas (Table 2).

#### Fee Type Change from SAF to SRP for Shorelines

Three TNF reservoirs (Apache Lake, Roosevelt Lake and Bartlett Lake) have accessible shorelines that are a major recreational attraction. When water levels are low, long flat stretches of shoreline are exposed and provide opportunities to car camp, fish, picnic, and swim right next to the water. Visitors tend to concentrate on these shoreline areas for immediate access to the water. On high use weekends, these shoreline areas can have rows of campers three or more deep.

Special services and management are targeted at health, safety and sanitation issues while protecting natural resources. These shoreline areas receive large numbers of visitors in a concentrated area, presenting additional public safety, security, and natural resource management challenges. The Forest Service and local Sheriff’s Departments work together to provide public safety and security services in these shoreline areas. Toilets and trash cans are provided above the high water line. After busy weekends, cleaning and pumping the toilets and collecting and removing trash is a costly workload. Fees collected along these shorelines will continue to support the maintenance, operations along these shorelines and the health and safety of visitors.

The Tonto Daily and Tonto Annual Pass will be the accepted fee payment mechanism SRP shorelines. Visitors launching motorized watercraft from one of the expanded amenity boat launches will still need to purchase a watercraft sticker for while using an expanded amenity boat launch.

## **Proposal II. Establish a New Fee for On-site Pass Purchase Option**

Comments from the open houses and findings from the Fee Attitude Survey made clear that TNF visitors want convenient ways to pay fees. Specifically, visitors would like options to purchase passes at or near recreation fee sites. While the TNF has a robust network of more than 200 vendor locations, and a web-based print-at-home daily pass, the Tonto proposes to install fee machines within popular recreation sites. The proposed new onsite fee is \$12 for the daily Tonto Pass and \$6 for Watercraft Sticker.

The TNF proposes to continue to promote its vendor network (off-site pass purchase option) as the primary Daily Tonto Pass purchase method. On-site pass options are proposed in response to an identified public request and to provide a convenience to those visitors arriving without a pass. A third-party contractor is required for fee machine operations and maintenance which increases the cost to offer this service.

- Visitors who purchase passes prior to arriving at a recreation site would pay the normal proposed rate of \$8 for a daily Tonto Pass and \$4 for a watercraft sticker.
- Cost for on-site daily Tonto Pass purchases (Daily Tonto Pass - \$12 and Watercraft Sticker - \$6) would be higher than buying passes from a retail vendor or Forest Service office because of cost of operating machines.
- Credit-card only fee machines would be placed at key recreation sites and visitors would pay a higher fee for the convenience of purchasing a pass on-site.
- The availability of Tonto Passes on-site will contribute to visitor convenience and respond to a desire by the public to have the option of an onsite payment method.

## **Proposal III. Fee Changes**

A Market Comparison revealed that some TNF fees are not consistent with fees for other recreation sites in central Arizona (Appendix B). In most cases, the fee revenue is not commensurate with the cost of operations and maintenance and does not offset the costs of management to the extent that is needed to keep the program sustainable.

### **Daily Tonto Pass – Fee Increase**

Public input in early 2013 demonstrated that most people (95%) do not want to see any further reductions in service at recreation sites. Many would like to see additional amenities, such as electrical hook-ups at campgrounds. While the TNF will continue to use all available options - appropriations, fees, partnerships, and volunteers - to meet visitor service and resource protection needs, additional fee revenue is necessary just to maintain the existing level of visitor services, including daily operations and reductions in deferred maintenance, as well as to protect previous substantial investments in these facilities and services at recreation fee sites.

The TNF proposes to increase the daily Tonto Pass from \$6 to \$8. Daily pass fees for similar recreation sites in Arizona range from \$5 to \$20. All TNF standard and expanded amenity sites are highly developed with restroom facilities, trash service, picnic tables, and parking. Many have water systems, flush toilets, and highly developed, multi-lane, paved boat launches. All standard and expanded amenity day use sites have the amenities required by the Recreation Enhancement Act.

- Increase Daily Tonto Pass to \$8.
- Valid for day use (standard amenity recreation sites and expanded amenity boat launches) and shoreline SRPs.
- A separate watercraft sticker would be required for launching a motorized watercraft (\$4) at expanded amenity boat launches.

### **Tonto Annual Pass – Fee Decrease**

The TNF proposes to offer a stand-alone Tonto Annual Pass that has the same benefits as the current annual pass but without the requirement of purchasing an Interagency Pass<sup>1</sup>. The Tonto Annual Pass would be a single pass for visitors who recreate frequently at EAF boat launches and SRP shorelines, in addition to SAF sites such as picnic areas (see Appendix C for a complete list of SAF, EAF boat launches, and SRP shorelines). Interagency passes (annual, senior, and access) are sufficient for visitors who only recreate at SAF sites (e.g., a separate Tonto Annual Pass is not needed).

- Decrease Tonto Annual Pass from \$95 to \$80.
- Valid for day use at SAF sites and EAF boat launches.
- Valid for day and overnight use at SRP shorelines.
- A separate watercraft sticker would not be required for Tonto Annual Pass holders.

### **Campgrounds and Rental of Group Day Use and Overnight Sites – Fee Increase**

Current camping fees and rental of group day use or overnight site fees do not cover the cost of managing and maintaining those sites, and have not for some time. Furthermore, \$6/night camping may prevent present and future private campgrounds from being in business in the same vicinity. It is proposed to increase the fees at developed family and group campgrounds, and group day use sites to cover the cost of daily operations, address a lengthy list of deferred maintenance items, and protect previous investments in campground amenities.

- Increase fees at 10 single-family campgrounds (Table 3).
  - Continue to offer 50% discount to Interagency Senior and Access Pass holders
  - Tonto Annual Pass is not valid at campgrounds
- Increase fees at six group campgrounds and one group picnic site (Table 4).
  - \$75 for group picnic sites and campgrounds that accommodate 50 people or less.
  - \$150 at group picnic sites and campgrounds that accommodate more than 50 people.
  - Cave Creek Group Campground will become a set fee and will no longer be covered by the Tonto Pass. Prices will be the same as the rest of the TNF's group sites for consistency and ability to reserve over the internet.
- Camping fees would cover the use of recreation fee sites and SRP shorelines where the Tonto Daily Pass is accepted on the TNF until noon the day of departure (i.e., a separate

Tonto Pass would not be needed for visitors who pay for camping). A Watercraft Sticker would need to be purchased if launching a boat at one of the EAF boat launches.

- Camping payment will only be accepted through on-site fee machines and the national reservation system.
- Fee for camping will vary by level of campground development. The least developed campgrounds which provide the basic services (tent site, parking, pit toilets, security, and fire rings) will cost less than campgrounds with water systems, flush toilets, and hot water showers).

### **Remove Sites from Fee Program – Eliminate Fees**


Several recreation sites are no longer meeting visitors’ needs due to their location and changing visitor use patterns. These sites will remain open to visitors, but visitors can expect reduced services.

- Eliminate fees at five recreation sites<sup>2</sup>, including Rattlesnake Group Campground, Warnica Springs Group Campground, and Haigler Creek Campground, Indian Point Campground, and Indian Point boat launch.






Tonto National Forest







# Tonto National Forest Proposed Special Recreation Permit Shorelines Cave Creek Ranger District





# Tonto National Forest Proposed Special Recreation Permit Shorlines Tonto Basin Ranger District

## Day Use, Watercraft, Overnight, and Annual Passes

Table 5 compares day use, watercraft, camping and annual pass fees for the current TNF fee structure, the Coconino, Coronado, and Prescott national forests, Bureau of Land Management (BLM), Arizona State Parks, and Maricopa County Parks including Lake Pleasant.

## Group Campgrounds

The TNF currently charges between \$40 and \$75 for groups of 25 to 150. Similar group campgrounds, including a concession managed campground on the TNF, charge from \$75-\$150 (Table 6). Arizona State Parks does not have group campgrounds. Maricopa County Parks charge a \$15 per unit fee, with a minimum reservation of 5 or 10 units.
