I should have made the color of this header blue because July was a very wet month. A heavy rain storm on July 19 cancelled both the Team Conasauga workday and the workday scheduled at Dry Creek. That is just the way it goes sometimes! The following weekend a small group did band together to tackle

some sling blading and blowdowns on the Rice Camp Trail. **Jim Leatherwood**, **Amos Burrell**, and **Larry Thomas** did a great job and got rattled by a rattlesnake. Thanks guys.

At the end of July, we welcomed a Student Conservation Association (SCA) high school trail crew onto the district. I personally was very excited to get to work with them because I was on two crews just like this when I was that age. The crew was headed by two crew leaders **Zack Podmore** and **Amanda Penny Nichols** and had eight crew members, who were from all over the country; **Morgan McFall-Johnsen** (Chicago, IL), **Michelle Fonda** (York, PA), **Julia Kaback** (New York, NY), **Rebecca Composto** (Philadelphia, PA), **Brett Mayville** (Newtown, MA), **Brandon Keogh** (Rochester, NY), **Jeremy Nicholson** (Boulder, CO), and **Lyle Winkler-Prins** (Arlington, VA). This was a



great crew: they all had at least one season of trail crew already under their belts and you could definitely tell by the work they put out. They spent two weeks camping and working in the Cohutta Wilderness on a reroute of the Upper Jacks River trail caused by a thirty foot wash out of the trail. The work site was about 2.5 miles in, between the first and second river crossings, and the reroute was



about a quarter mile long. They worked very hard to complete this large project doing what it took including bucking downfall, clearing rhododendron, building tread, installing rolling grade dips, and a set of seven steps. Upon completion of the reroute, the crew did a 15-mile backpacking work trip to Jack's River Falls and back to the trailhead on the Penitentiary Branch Trail. Along the way the crew bucked approximately 20

trees of varying diameters and brushed 5 miles of trail including the Jacks River Canyon. The backpacking trip was challenging but rewarding work for everyone. Thank you so much for all the hard work and best of luck on all your future endeavors.


> > > > **August** < < < <

What a great month this was. We had two volunteer events and the National Forests of Georgia's celebration of the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Wilderness Act.





Wilderness Act. The event, titled “Inspiring Stewardship”, was held at Hancock Park in Dahlonega, GA. Forest Service employees, Volunteers, and members of the Public all came together to celebrate Wilderness. During the event there was great live music and several amazing speakers which included **Nathan Mynatt**, a SAWS ranger working in Georgia’s Wildernesses; **Betty**



**Jewett**, Forest Supervisor for the Chattahoochee-Oconee National Forest; **Liz Agpaoa**, Regional Forester; the key note speaker was **Dale Bosworth**, former

Chief of the Forest Service; and the event was emceed by **John Campbell**, Recreation Program Manager with the Chattahoochee-Oconee National Forests. They all had exciting things to say about the past and future of wilderness both in Georgia and across America. In conjunction with the speakers, the event also had several interactive stations for guests. Many wilderness stewardship partners set up booths to educate the public and gain new support. This was an amazing event that really showed the high level of appreciation Georgia has for its Wilderness areas. During the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Event, one of the objectives for the Team Conasauga booth was to advertise our September workday. Our charge was to repair all the waterbars on the north end of the East Cowpen Trail. We easily completed the task despite the amount of work some of them needed. We took lunch just shy of the gap at the trail junction below Buckeye Mountain. We finished the rolling grade dips and took a small break at the gap while Robert and Derek hiked to the top of Buckeye Mountain. We hiked down the mountain to the trailhead together, shared food and fellowship, and concluded a great day of wilderness stewardship. Thank you for all the hard work.



Also on Saturday, October 4<sup>th</sup> the Dry Creek Volunteers had a great work day. They had twelve Volunteers equally representing both the Back Country Horsemen of Northwest Georgia and the Northwest Georgia chapter of the

AND finally, we conclude the fiscal year and this newsletter with the 24<sup>th</sup> annual **Volunteer Appreciation Picnic** held on October 25. The picnic was held again this year at the Pocket Campground pavilion. It was a beautiful day with a very nice turnout to celebrate the accomplishments of our great volunteer community this year. So what were we celebrating? This year on the Conasauga Ranger District we had 140 Volunteers contributing a total of 3,577 hours of service. In addition, the



two camp hosts, **Tim Woody** at Lake Conasauga and **Bobby Hatfield** at the Pocket campgrounds, accorded 1,243 hours. We had 4 Boy Scout Eagle Scout projects that included 67 participants and totaled 650 hours of work. The motor trail volunteers were busy in the spring, recording over 325 hours of work for nearly \$5,000 worth of the matching funding that allows us to continue to utilize State funds for maintaining the OHV trails. We also had two youth crews on the district

this year, an 8 person Alternative Spring Break crew from Northern Illinois University, and an 8 person YCC/SCA combination crew. Together they contributed another 960 hours to our trails program for a grand total on the district of 6,755 hours which is an increase of over 1,000 hours over last year's grand total. This mountain of work touched over 75% of our trail system on the District. It also helped complete many major projects across the District like the completion of the Dennis Mill section of the Pinhoti, a reroute around a small landslide on the Jacks River trail, the reconstruction of the 200 foot long boardwalk on the Pocket loop trail, a new kiosk at the Chickamauga Creek trail, the blazing of the Bear Creek trail, the development of a 5 year trail plan, and the planning and performance of multiple Wilderness 50<sup>th</sup> celebration events.

So, **Yes** there was plenty to celebrate this year.



All these accomplishments would not be achievable without a strong and vibrant volunteer community. Inside this community we have some outstanding individuals that we like to give a special thanks to each year by recognizing them as Top Guns. Each one of these five volunteers gave at least 150 hours of service



this year and together have thousands of hours over their tenure. First is **Larry Thomas**, who gave 150.5 hours this year with a lifetime total of 370.5 hours. Second is **Jim Holland** with 157 hours this year and 1,377 lifetime hours. Third is **Larry Wheat** with 173.25 hours this year with 1,569 lifetime hours. Fourth

is **Troy Brown** with 216.5 hours this year with a lifetime total of 9,102.5 hours. Our fifth and top contributor this year is **Wanda Brown** with 279 hours this year and a lifetime total of 8,709 hours. Thank you all so much for your contributions this year. For all those who were not mentioned, please do not let it diminish your importance. You make up the rest of our large Volunteer Community and are just too numerous to list in this format. It is because of you that we get all these great projects completed and achieve more and more stewardship each and every year.
