Recreation Program Fee Accomplishment Report 2013

Recreation fees are an investment in outdoor recreation. Current and future generations will benefit as 95% of the funds are reinvested in the facilities and services that visitors enjoy, use and value.

Accomplishments Provided with Recreation Fees:

- Completed operation and maintenance tasks at recreation fee sites:
 - Collected trash and recyclables
 - Cleaned and pumped more than 30 vault toilets regularly.
 - Maintained campsites and campground trails.
 - Identified and removed hazard trees and limbs at sites.
 - Patrolled and checked compliance at fee sites.
- Recruited and supported volunteer hosts in Smith River National Recreation Area and Orleans and Lower Trinity Ranger Districts. These volunteers contributed over 6,300 hours valued at more than \$139,000.
- Installed new signs at several recreation sites and trailheads.
- Maintained campground drinking water systems and purchased needed supplies.
- Corrected and updated online information on camp sites reservable through www.recreation.gov.
- Coordinated employees who completed visitor use surveys.
- Administered and monitored outfitter and guide special use permits.

Volunteers are valued, skilled members of forest staffs across the nation. 

Six Rivers Accomplishments Continued

- Repaired and/or replaced restroom faucets, painted restroom floors, and replaced obsolete fee station lighting with solar lighting at Panther Flat Campground.
- Provided project planning and support for Wooley Creek bridge replacement on the Haypress Trail in Marble Mountain Wilderness and interior road maintenance at Fish Lake Campground.
- Sanded and painted picnic tables for Orleans Ranger District sites.
- Supported a Youth Conservation Corps crew who rebuilt and replaced picnic tables at Horse Linto Trailhead and completed projects at Ammon Ranch.
- With assistance from the Mad River Hot Shot Crew, removed hazard trees, cleared brush and trimmed vegetation at Mad River Campground.
- Supported a volunteer who removed brush and leaves, collected litter, and maintained campgrounds at Mad River Ranger District sites.
- Replaced five old concrete picnic tables with new ones at North Fork Campground.
- Repaired a water system leak under an accessible campground trail, replaced stolen water faucet hose bibs and handles, and contracted a portable toilet during two water system outages at Patrick Creek Campground.
- Replaced stolen sign posts and water faucet hose bibs and handles, and tested drinking water at Grassy Flat Campground.
- Repaired boardwalk railings and contracted a portable toilet for Darlingtonia Interpretive Trail.
