
Tucked away in the Craigs Creek arm of Laurel River Lake on London Ranger District, this area is designated for group camping. The sites are for tent camping only and do not have electricity. The day-use picnic shelter fits 60 guests, and the group campsites fit up to 30 or 60 guests, depending on the location. Reservations for campsites or the picnic shelter (day-use only) are available at www.recreation.gov or by calling 1-877-444-6777.

Each group camp area comes with a campfire circle, large grill, picnic tables and a lantern pole. Accessible flush toilets and a shower house are available. A spacious sports field and horseshoe pits is near the picnic shelter.

Craigs Creek Trail #420 connects the group area with the boat ramp and provides scenic views of Laurel River Lake. The campground has no beach for swimming. A public beach is operated by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers at the Laurel River Lake dam.

FOOD STORAGE REQUIRED. Visitors in developed sites must store food, garbage and other odorous items that may attract bears in a bear-resistant container, inside their vehicle, or in an enclosed hard-body trailer. Backcountry campers must suspend food, garbage and odorous items at least 10 feet off the ground and four feet away from any tree or pole. All food leftovers and trash must be properly disposed of in a bear-resistant trash receptacle or other container where provided by the Forest Service.



Craigs Creek Group Use Area





