

ORDER NO. 01-15-01
WILLIAMSON ROCK AREA CLOSURE
ANGELES NATIONAL FOREST

Pursuant to 16 USC 551 and 36 CFR 261.50(a) and (b), and to protect natural resources, the following acts are prohibited within the Santa Clara/Mojave Rivers Ranger District of the Angeles National Forest. This Order is effective from January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2015.

1. Going into or being upon the Williamson Rock Closure Area, as described in Exhibit A and shown on the attached map. 36 CFR 261.53(a).
2. Being on any National Forest System trail within the Williamson Rock Closure Area as shown on the attached map. 36 CFR 261.55(a).

Pursuant to 36 CFR 261.50(e), the following persons are exempt from this Order:

1. Persons with a permit from the Forest Service specifically authorizing the otherwise prohibited act or omission.
2. Any Federal, State or local officer, or member of an organized rescue or firefighting force in the performance of an official duty.

These prohibitions are in addition to the general prohibitions contained in 36 CFR Part 261, Subpart A.

A violation of these prohibitions is punishable by a fine of not more than \$5,000 for an individual or \$10,000 for an organization, or imprisonment for not more than six months or both. 16 USC 551 and 18 USC 3559, 3571 and 3581.

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Exhibit A

The boundary of the Williamson Rock Closure Area begins at the intersection of California State Highway 2 (Angeles Crest Highway) and the Pacific Crest National Scenic Trail in Township 3 North, Range 9 West, Section 7, San Bernardino Base and Meridian; then continues due north to its intersection with Little Rock Creek; then continues due west to its intersection with the High Desert National Recreation Trail (Forest Trail No. 10W02) in Township 3 North, Range 10 West, Section 11; then continues due south to its intersection with California State Highway 2 in Township 3 North, Range 10 West, Section 14; and then continues east along the northern edge of California State Highway 2 back to the starting point..

Subject: Forest Order – Williamson Rock Area Closure

Pursuant to 36 CFR 261, I am issuing Forest Order No. 01-15-01 authorizing a continued temporary closure of the Williamson Rock area on the Santa Clara/Mojave Rivers Ranger District of the Angeles National Forest (ANF). The area affected is depicted on the map attached to the Closure Order. The closure will be in effect from January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2015, and will address concerns related to the protection of the mountain yellow-legged frog (MYLF) and its critical habitat in the area. Hikers using the Pacific Crest National Scenic Trail will continue to be re-routed around the closed area.

As part of a larger lawsuit brought by a coalition of environmental groups against various federal agencies, in June 2011 a U.S. District Court Judge ordered the Forest Service to close the Williamson Rock area because of the presence of the MYLF (*Center for Biological Diversity, Los Padres ForestWatch, Sierra Club, Defenders of Wildlife and California Native Plant Society v. U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, National Marine Fisheries Service, and U.S. Forest Service*; No. C 08-01278 MHP, 6/27/2011). The Angeles National Forest is preparing an Environmental Assessment to address resource issues that have made it necessary to close the Williamson Rock area to public access.

Interface between recreational forest users and the MYLF is a subject of concern at Williamson Rock. Recreation activities within the creek habitat may lead to disturbance of egg masses, trampling of individual frogs, capture and handling of tadpoles and adult frogs, and generalized disruption of mating and migration. Recreation may also impact habitat by altering streambeds and denuding banks, and lead to the introduction of pollutants and garbage into the creek. Due to remoteness and current lack of facilities, human waste may also contaminate critical habitat because if it is not disposed of properly.

This decision is categorically excluded from documentation under Forest Service Handbook 1909.15, Section 31.12(1) – Orders issued pursuant to 36 CFR Part 261 – Prohibitions to provide short-term resource protection or to protect public health and safety. This is not a project or activity implementing a land and resource management plan that is documented in a decision memo, decision notice, or record of decision. I find there are no extraordinary circumstances that might cause the action to have significant environmental effects; therefore the proposed action is excluded from documentation in an Environmental Impact Statement or Environmental Assessment. Extraordinary circumstances would include but are not limited to negative impacts on the following:

1. Federally listed threatened or endangered species or designated critical habitat, species proposed for federal listing or proposed critical habitat, or Forest Service sensitive species.



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Preservation of the MYLF and its critical habitat will be enhanced by eliminating human activities within the closure area.

2. Flood plains, wetlands, or municipal watersheds.

This action will have no negative impacts on flood plains, wetlands, and municipal watersheds within the closure area.

3. Congressionally designated areas, such as Wilderness, Wilderness Study areas, or National Recreation Areas.

The closure area overlaps a portion of the Pleasant View Ridge Wilderness, a congressionally designated Wilderness Area and will have no negative impact. Inventoried roadless areas.

4. There are no inventoried roadless areas within the closure area.

5. Research Natural Areas

There is no Research Natural Area within the closure area.

6. American Indian and Alaska Native religious or cultural areas.

There are no identified Native American or Alaska Native religious or cultural sites within the closure area.

7. Archaeological sites or historic properties or areas.

There are archaeological sites or historic properties within the area. This action will not have an effect on these sites.


Public information meetings were conducted extensively between 2009 and 2011 as part of the ongoing efforts to resolve the situation. Meetings were held with representatives of the rock climbing community since the popular rock climbing site (Williamson Rock) is within the area. Public notification regarding the Pacific Crest National Scenic Trail re-route has been done and will continue. In 2014, coordination with the following cooperating agencies has continued:

 - Fire Department
 - Sheriff's Department
- State of California
 - Department of Fish and Game
 - Highway Patrol
 - CalTrans
- U.S. Department of the Interior
 - Fish and Wildlife Service

Additional public involvement activities are planned for 2015 in connection with the Environmental Impact Statement that is underway.
