District Fire Management Officer GS-0301-9/11

The West Zone of the Modoc National Forest is looking for a highly motivated person for a 120 day non-competitive detail/temporary promotion opportunity into a GS-0301-9/11 position as a District Fire Management Officer (DFMO). The DFMO works directly for the District Ranger and manages the fire, fuels management and fire prevention programs on two ranger districts which have been combined into one zone. The DFMO is responsible for coordination of fire and fuels activities with the forest fire staff, other zone and cooperators. The west zone fire and fuels organization consists of four overhead positions, five engine modules, one dozer module, two fuels technicians and two fire prevention technicians. The incumbent will directly supervise three Assistant District Fire Management Officers (two operations one fuels). This position is categorized as a District Fire Management Officer at a High complexity unit that is subject to the Forest Service Fire Program Management (FS-FPM) Standard and Guide. The desired qualifications for the incumbent of this position are Division/Group Supervisor and Incident Commander Type 3. This detail/temporary promotion opportunity may run from May through August 2015. The duty station for this position will be either Tulelake or Adin, CA.

ABOUT THE FOREST:

The Modoc National Forest, situated in extreme northeastern California, boasts an ecologically diverse landscape. It is a land of contrasts, with ecosystems ranging from pine and fir dominated mountains to high desert plateaus covered with sage brush and juniper. It is one of the largest national forests in California at about 1.68 million acres. Administratively it is managed from the Forest Supervisor's Office in Alturas and two zones encompassing four ranger districts with offices in Adin, Tulelake, Alturas and Cedarville. The climate also exhibits contrasts, with average high temperatures in July being 88 degrees and average lows in January in the teens. With the average annual precipitation being about 12 inches there is an abundance of days with clear blue skies. Elevations range from 9,892 feet at Eagle Peak atop the Warner Mountains to 4,000 feet in the valleys.

The Forest manages a variety of programs, including wildlife, vegetation, range, recreation, minerals, wilderness, special uses, heritage, watershed, fuels and fire suppression. Specialists working here include botanists, foresters, wildlife and fishery biologists, archaeologists, range conservationists, engineers, fire and fuels managers, business management and public relations professionals. These specialists work on a variety of challenging issues including: sage steppe restoration, wildhorse territory management, the largest rangeland management program in Region 5, managing fire across the landscape, and landscape scale restoration.

The Forest is primarily situated in beautiful Modoc County. With a population of about 10,000 the County is among the most rural in California. It borders Oregon to the north and Nevada to the east. Alturas is the County Seat and location of the Forest Supervisor's Office, and is about 3 ¼ hours (170 miles) from Reno, NV; 2 ¾ hours (145 miles) from Redding, CA; and 1 ¾ hours (98) miles from Klamath Falls, OR. All

these cities offer major shopping opportunities and Reno and Redding offer airport services. There is a medical clinic in Alturas with major medical services available in Reno and Redding.

While the key to real estate is location, location, location; for many who come and stay on the Modoc the key is lifestyle, lifestyle, lifestyle. The Modoc lifestyle has much to offer, being more rural and remote. A slower pace offers a welcome relief from the "hustle and bustle" of urban life. The nights are quiet and peaceful, and with minimal light pollution the sky is full of stars. There are ample recreational opportunities, including fishing and hunting, that are uncrowded. There is strong community support and the local community is interested and involved in Forest programs. If you are looking for a place that offers a low stress lifestyle and safe community, the Modoc is for you.

Community information:

About Adin:

Adin is a rural northeast California community of about 550 people and is located in the heart of beautiful Big Valley. Big Valley consists of four small towns Adin, Bieber, Lookout and Nubieber. Surrounded by picturesque mountain peaks, there are many captivating views of Mt. Shasta and Lassen Peak that can be seen from the area. Modoc and Lassen Counties boast a distinctively rural atmosphere that includes forested plateaus, green mountains, snow-capped peaks, and vast open agricultural valleys.

With two major state highways running through it Hwy 299 and 139, it's easy to get to major cities such as Portland 475, San Francisco 307, Redding 94, Reno 160, and Klamath Falls 97.

The climate in Big Valley is characterized by four distinct seasons, with an average summer high of 93 and an average low in the winter of 28. Snowfall averaging ten inches per year is normal for the valley areas with more abundant amounts falling in the higher regions.

About Tulelake:

The Doublehead Ranger District Office is located in Tulelake, CA. Tulelake is a farming community with a population of 1000, which is situated at an elevation of 4,034 feet. The climate is mild with rainfall averaging 11 inches per year. The town has a post office, grocery store, which also serves as a gasoline station, hardware store, bank, automobile parts stores, a satellite Department of Motor Vehicles office, restaurant, fast food stand, a small medical clinic, and county library office. The public schools provide instruction from kindergarten through high school. Tulelake is also located six miles from Merrill, Oregon, which is a small thriving community with amenities, while Klamath Falls, Oregon is the nearest big city 25 miles north of Tulelake, CA. In Klamath Falls there are the large shopping malls, banks, law offices, medical centers, hospital, community and technical colleges, public schools, restaurants, art galleries, museums, marina, movie theater, airport, train station, bus terminal, and other businesses. About Klamath Falls:

Klamath Falls, the county seat, is located in the south central portion of Oregon at an elevation of 4,100 feet. The population of Klamath Falls (city and suburbs) is approximately 45,000. Klamath County is noted for being the “Sunshine City of Oregon” since it has an average of 290 days of sunshine per year.

Community facilities include one full-service hospital with 176 beds, 2 urgent care centers, over 70 churches representing approximately 40 denominations, 2 performing theaters, several museums and art galleries, the YMCA, 9 public elementary schools, 3 middle schools, 3 high schools, 3 private schools, Klamath Community College, and Oregon Institute of Technology, the Pacific Northwest’s only public polytechnic institute. Several large department stores such as Wal-Mart, Fred Meyer and Home Depot are located within the city limits. Grocery stores are plentiful. Klamath Falls is also home to 3 indoor pools, 1 outdoor pool, 1 private 18-hole, 3 public 18-hole, and 1 nine-hole golf course. The local newspaper is the Herald and News from Klamath Falls. The Oregonian from Portland is also available.

Klamath Falls is located at the intersection of Highways 39, 66, 97, and 130. Transportation is available through Amtrak and bus services. The Rogue Valley International – Medford Airport is a full service airport located in Medford 70, miles to the southwest of Klamath Falls. There is a shuttle available for trips to Medford/Ashland. Klamath Falls is ideally situated approximately 1 1/2 hours from Ashland, Oregon, 5 1/2 hours from Portland, Oregon, 6 hours from San Francisco, California, and 4 1/2 hours from Reno, Nevada.

Recreation opportunities include wilderness backpacking, hiking, boating, camping, sailing, fishing, biking, snowmobiling, cross country skiing, horseback riding, hunting, and bird watching. Downhill skiing and sledding opportunities are available at Mt. Bachelor Ski Park in Bend, OR; located approximately 3 hours away, or Mt. Shasta Recreation Area in Shasta City, California; located approximately 1 1/2 hour away, as is Mt. Ashland Ski Park in Ashland, Oregon. Within 1 – 1 1/2 hours away from Klamath Falls, you may find yourself at Crater Lake National Park or Lava Beds National Monument.
