WATER SAFETY

Slippery rocks, hazards below the surface, and the strength of moving water all affect your safety. Depth, clarity, speed, and hydraulic forces can vary tremendously. Always be responsible and assess the risks before entering any section of water.



This 1.5 mile trail offers a living classroom in forest ecology. It includes interpretive panels featuring both natural and managed forest practices.
