Jess Weaver (No Name) Trail #1847

Length: 7.6 miles one-way (12.2 km one-way)

Beginning Elevation: 5,840 ft. (1780 m)

USGS Quad Maps: Glenwood Springs, Carbonate

Difficulty: Moderate

Ending Elevation: 10,045 ft. (3062 m)

Use: Heavy

ACCESS: From Glenwood Springs, go east on I-70 for 2 miles to exit 119 (No Name exit). Exit to the right, then turn left and cross over I-70. Proceed straight approximately 0.5 miles to the trailhead. Please be considerate of nearby private property and obey all posted parking signs. If the trailhead parking area is full, park at No Name Rest Area and walk or ride back up the road.

TRAIL OVERVIEW: Jess Weaver Trail (also known as No Name Trail) runs through No Name Canyon. The trail closely follows No Name Creek along its entire length and offers users a scenic trip from the bottom of the canyon to the southeastern edge of the Flat Tops. Elevations gradually increase as one traverses the trail from south to north. No Name Creek provides good fishing opportunities, and the surrounding area is a popular location for big game hunting. This route is accessible from its south end year round; use is heaviest in the summer and fall, but the trail also makes for an interesting winter excursion.

The south end of the trail is at No Name Trailhead, which is a short distance north of I-70. The northern end of the trail is at Forest Road-631 near Yellow Lake.

No services are available at either end of the trail, but the No Name Rest Area has restrooms and water.

TRAIL OPEN TO THE FOLLOWING USES: Hiking and horseback riding

ETHICS/REGULATIONS:

- Please be respectful of other trail users
- Please refrain from littering: Pack It In & Pack It Out!
- No camping within 100 feet of any surface waters
