SPECIAL AGENT IN CHARGE, LAW ENFORCEMENT & INVESTIGATIONS



Bryan Roemeling has been the Alaska Region Special Agent in Charge since August 2006. In his role, he is responsible for the oversight and management of the law enforcement and investigations program within National Forest Systems land throughout Alaska.

Roemeling has worked for the Forest Service for 23 years, spending 17 years in Law Enforcement and Investigations and six years in a variety of positions. In 1984, he became a volunteer on the Tongass National Forest. He then moved to Missouri for a permanent research position working on the Forest Inventory and Analysis crew. He later became a forester on the Medicine Bow National Forest, Wyo.

Roemeling has worked at every level of the organization—district, forest, region and the Washington Office. The diversity of working in multiple assignments in seven regions and Washington, D.C. has provided him with a broad base of experience and given him valuable insights, which contribute to the success of the law enforcement program in the Alaska Region.

Roemeling received a Bachelors of Science in Forestry Management with a minor in Environmental Law Enforcement from the University of Wisconsin–Stevens Point. He successfully completed Basic Law Enforcement training at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center in 1994 and Criminal Investigation training in 2001.

The Tongass and Chugach are the two largest single national forests in the nation. The Tongass National Forest Stretches the 500-mile length of the Alaska Panhandle. The Chugach National Forest makes the 210-mile arc around Prince William Sound. The beauty and bounty of these forests draw attention from around the nation and the world.

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
