

Winter Recreation Guide Lassen National Forest



Enjoy winter recreation on the Lassen National Forest!

A brisk cold breeze against your face and the thrill of seeing fresh snow covering the landscape. That's what winter recreation on the Lassen National Forest is all about.

The Forest has six winter snowmobile areas on three Ranger Districts. The number of miles of groomed versus ungroomed trails varies by each area.

In addition to snowmobiling, the Forest is also open to cross-country skiing and snowshoeing. These winter activities are allowed on groomed and ungroomed snowmobile trails. Wheeled vehicles, such as 4-Wheel Drives and All-Terrain Vehicles (ATVs), are restricted from all groomed and ungroomed marked trails. However, wheeled vehicles are permitted elsewhere on the forest when there is at least 18 inches of snow.

Review this map carefully for areas that are closed to all motor vehicles. Lassen Volcanic National Park, Caribou Wilderness, Thousand Lakes Wilderness, Ishi Wilderness, proposed wildernesses, other special areas and some cross-country ski trails are closed to all motor vehicles. Exceptions within Lassen Volcanic National Park are the plowed entrances on Hwy 89, which are open to highway licensed vehicles. Operators are responsible for knowing where they are to avoid entry into motor vehicle closure areas. Please remember to respect private property and do not trespass.

Check with the local Ranger District office to find out which areas are open to snowmobiling as snow conditions vary in the early and late season.

Sharing Routes

In some areas of the Forest, those traveling by skis, snowshoes and snowmobiles share the same routes and areas. Consideration of others is necessary for everyone's enjoyment and safety. The following suggestions will provide safe routes for everyone.

Operate snow machines at minimum speed near skiers and snowshoers. Maintain minimum speed until well beyond those on foot.

Do not operate over-the-snow vehicles on trails designated for skiers and snowshoers only.

Cross-country skiers and snowshoe enthusiasts should realize that snowmobile operators are not able to hear approaching trail users. On steep topography, snowmobiles are generally limited to the developed trail surface. On shared corridors, skiers should ski single file and keep poles and arms out of the way of passing over-the-snow machines. Use courtesy and respect so that all users can safely enjoy their winter travel.

Reading This Map

The grid lines you see on this map are latitude and longitude. They do not correspond with township, range and section lines that you may be familiar with on our Forest Visitor Map or US Geological Survey quad maps. For accurate navigation, GPS users should be sure that their GPS units are set to the latitude/longitude (WGS 1984 datum) coordinate system. For most recreational GPS receivers this is the default coordinate system setting.

Winter Recreation on the Eagle Lake Ranger District

Snowmobiling Opportunities

The Eagle Lake Ranger District manages 160 miles of groomed trails, two major snowmobile areas, several cross-country ski trails and one snow play area for sporting families who wish to haul sleds or toboggans up a gentle slope and enjoy a slippery slide down.

Fredonyer Snowmobile Area is located 10 miles west of Susanville on Highway 36 and has 80 miles of groomed trails, a large parking area and a restroom. The area north of the highway accesses the Swain Mountain trail system. The southern area features loop trails and connections to trails on the Plumas National Forest. The trail around Hamilton Mountain features scenic views and accesses more technically challenging trails to Moonlight Peak and Red Rock lookout. Fredonyer routes are a combination of forest and open meadows, with more diverse terrain through Crazy Harry Gulch. This system offers spectacular views of the Great Basin and the high country around Lassen Peak.

Bogard Snowmobile Area is about 25 miles northwest of Susanville on Highway 44 and has 80 miles of groomed trails. East of Highway 44 features the wide-open meadows of Pine Creek Valley. These ungroomed meadows are open for snowmobiling, but riders should watch for fence lines and water under the snow in the spring season.

The east-side groomed trails feature two routes that climb up to panoramic views. One is a 16-mile trip up to the Antelope Mountain Lookout with vistas that overlook Lassen Volcanic National Park, Mt. Shasta, the Warner Mountains and beyond. The other climb is 7 miles and takes you to Crater Lake; please stay off the thin ice covering the lake. Other trails continue 30 miles eastward, following gentle forest roads beyond the Pine Creek Valley towards Eagle Lake. Trails on the west-side of Bogard wind through pine and fir forests and climb to higher elevations. They connect to trails around Hat Creek Rim to the north and the Swain Mountain system to the south.

Cross-Country Ski Adventures and Sledding/Tubing Fun

Gold Run Road Tour. This tour is 8 miles round trip to the top of Gold Run Road and rated difficult. Park at Gold Run Road (County Road 204) where the snow-plowing ends. This route maintains a fairly steep grade and climbs 2,400 feet in under 4 miles. Snowmobilers also use this route. Once at the top of Gold Run Road, endearing touring possibilities exist along Diamond Mountain Ridge toward Red Rock Lookout. Your ski descent will be fast and, depending on the time of day, not unlike a huge course. Be cautious and watch for snowmobiles.

Bizz Johnson Ski Trail and Yehudi Challenge. A real favorite for Nordic skiers is the historic Bizz Johnson Trail, which connects Susanville to Westwood along the Susan River. The entire trail is 25 miles long and rated easy. The northern exposure and shading on the upper part of the trail provides excellent skiing conditions. Park in Susanville at the historic Susanville Depot on Richmond Road, at Devil's Corral off Highway 36 or off County Road A-1, 4 miles north of Westwood near the Mason Station Trailhead. All motor vehicles are restricted from Susanville to Westwood Junction (18 miles). From Westwood Junction to Mason Station, you will share the trail with snowmobilers.

Roxie Peconum Trail. The trail is a 5 mile round trip to Roxie Peconum Campground and rated easy. Park off Highway 36 at Willard Hill (forest road 29N03). You will likely see many people snowplaying on Willard Hill. Ski up the road along scenic Willard Creek, but watch for snowmobiles.

Willard Hill is an undeveloped sledding and tubing snow play area located 10 miles west of Susanville on Highway 36 at Willard Creek Road (forest road 29N03). While popular with local families, the hill is not maintained or patrolled by the Forest Service on a regular basis. Limited parking is available.

Fredonyer Pass Tours. There are endless possibilities for skiing here. Park at the Fredonyer Pass parking lot. Be sure to park away from the groomed trail to allow snowmobile access to it. The groomed trail along forest road 29N46 is level for about 1.5 miles and then ascends steeply to views of Coppervale Ski Hill and Lassen Peak. Be sure to watch for snowmobiles as this is a very popular sled route.

Coppervale Adventure. This tour is 5 miles round trip and rated moderate. Park off Highway 36 just west of Coppervale Ski Hill at forest road 29N05. The 101 Ranch is just west of the road and the first mile is on private land with a Forest Service easement. Ski only on the road. The trail starts level and then ascends quickly through a diverse forest of pine, fir, cedar and aspen. After 2 miles, the road levels at a large aspen grove before continuing upward. Please turn around at the Forest boundary.

Hog Flat Reservoir. This is a perfect loop for beginning skiers. Hog Flat beckons skiers with gently rolling trails and scenic valleys surrounded by mountains reaching to elevations of up to 7,000 feet. Park off Highway 44 at the Goutamz Road (forest road 30N03) intersection. Keep right and ski around the edge of the frozen reservoir. Let your inspiration, the views and terrain determine your route.

Eagle Lake Tour. This tour is 10 miles round trip and rated easy. If snow conditions permit, the trail offers a spectacular ski adventure. Bald eagles, waterfowl and whistling swans winter over in the Eagle Lake Basin. It is well worth bringing binoculars, taking your time and enjoying the bird life. Park off County Road A-1 (access is from Highway 139 as the Eagle Lake Road from Susanville is not plowed in the winter). Ski on the paved bike trail or along the shoreline from Christie Campground to Gallatin Beach. Motor vehicles are restricted all along the Eagle Lake shoreline.

Eagle Lake Adventure to Antelope Mountain. This adventure is 10 miles round trip and rated difficult. The approach to this trail is from the east side of Antelope Mountain. Ski forest road 32N02 a couple of miles and then bear left cross country to the top of Antelope Mountain (elevation 7,684 feet) for spectacular views.

Lassen Trail and Robbers Creek Aspen Trip. There are 5 and 10 mile options and the trail is rated easy to moderate. Although the aspen trees do not have their leaves, skiing amongst their white trunks is magical. This adventure includes some meandering south of Swain Meadow and skiing around the volcanic tablelands of the historic Lassen Trail. Park off County Road A-21 near Mason Station, 4 miles north of Westwood. Follow forest road 30N53 north or 29N19Y and 29N32Y to the northwest.

Silver Lake Area Tour. This is a 10 mile round trip adventure and rated moderate. Park at the junction of County Road A-21 and County Road 110. The trail starts off level and then gradually ascends with the Susan River alongside you. Many spur roads lead to other ski tour possibilities. The Caribou Wilderness extends past Silver Lake.

Butte Lake Tour. Butte Lake Road (forest road 32N21) is 13 miles round trip and rated moderate. Park off Highway 44 on the Butte Lake Road. This scenic road is level for the first two miles and then ascends slightly to Butte Lake in Lassen Volcanic National Park. Longer options and loop trails are available in this area. Watch out for an occasional snowmobile.

Downhill Skiing Opportunities

Coppervale Ski Hill. This small ski area is located 15 miles west of Susanville on Highway 36. Not on national forest land, Coppervale Ski Area is operated by Lassen Community College on a seasonal basis as snow conditions allow. This is a popular hill for families and beginning skiers. Ski lessons are offered on Saturdays and Sundays, and Tuesday and Thursday afternoons through Lassen Community College. The ski area has groomed runs, a poma lift, rope tow, rustic warming hut and a restroom. For more information about the area, please contact:

Snowmobiling Opportunities

Morgan Summit Snowmobile Area is located 4 miles east of Mineral on Highway 36 and has 77 miles of groomed trails, a large parking area, restrooms and a warming hut. The Morgan Summit trail system can also be accessed from Mill Creek on Highway 172 and Mineral at the junction of Highways 36 and 172. There are several loop trails that

Snowmobiling Checklist

Snowmobiling is a great sport; keep it that way by observing safety precautions. This list of equipment is the recommended minimum for day trips. Additional items are required for overnight trips.

- Proper and Extra Clothing
- Properly Fitting Helmet
- Beverages (not alcohol)
- Water
- Lunch and Emergency Food
- Snowshoes or Skis (for each person)
- Tools and Extra Gas in Safety Cans
- First Aid Kit

- Tow Rope or Avalanche Cord
- Emergency Flares
- Tarp (for temporary shelter)
- Pocket Knife
- Space Blanket

are considered easy, but the old jeep road to Turner Mountain can be difficult as the road is narrow. On a clear day you can see the Sacramento Valley, Sutter Buttes, Lake Almanor and Mt. Shasta from the Turner Mountain Lookout.

Jonesville Snowmobile Area is about 2 miles east of Cherry Hill Campground on the Humboldt Road (County Road 91422), which is accessed via Highway 32. The area can also be accessed from the east end of the Humboldt Road (County Road 308) on Highway 89 along the west shore of Lake Almanor. Jonesville offers 60 miles of groomed trails and three loops. Most routes follow the Humburg and Humboldt Roads. Spectacular views of the Lake Almanor Basin can be seen from the Yellow Creek loop while Colby Mountain Lookout is a popular destination.

Swain Mountain Snowmobile Area is located just off County Road A-21, approximately 9 miles north of Westwood. The area can also be accessed just east of Chester at the Chester-Lake Almanor Staging Area on Highway 36. Swain Mountain has 60 miles of groomed trails, which include three loop trails. All routes are easy.

Swain Mountain is considered the hub of the forest's snowmobile trail system. It is usually the first staging area to open with enough snow for snowmobiling when winter commences and the last area to thaw in the spring. The area provides direct access to the Bogard and Fredonyer trail systems, offering 200 miles of marked trails (both groomed and ungroomed). Visitors to Swain Mountain are reminded that there are restricted use areas (Caribou Wilderness and Lassen Volcanic National Park) in close proximity to the groomed trails in this area. The parking lot is currently being expanded to accommodate more users and overnight recreational vehicle camping.

Cross-Country Ski Adventures

McGowan Lake Tours. The McGowan Lake Cross-Country Ski Area has been in existence since 1982 and offers 10 miles of trails, 5 miles of which are periodically groomed. Access is on Highway 89, two miles north of Highway 36 and near the southern entrance to Lassen Volcanic National Park. Trails, literally in the shadow of Lassen Peak, wander through mixed conifer forest and are popular with beginning to advanced skiers. Elevations range from 5,020 to 6,200 feet. McGowan cross-country ski trails are closed to all motorized vehicles.



Lake Almanor Recreation Trail. This trail is an easy to moderate 19 mile round trip opportunity. Park at the junction of Highway 89 and forest road 27N52 to begin. Skiers may also access the trail from numerous points along Highway 89 for shorter 4 to 5 mile round trips. This trail winds through a mixed conifer forest with spectacular views of Lake Almanor, Dyer Mountain and Lassen Peak. Watch for wildlife as you may see bald eagles, osprey and goshawk. The trail is closed to all motorized vehicles.

Colby Mountain Adventure. The area offers 9 miles of ungroomed cross-country ski trails for beginning and advanced skiers. Colby Mountain is located on the western slope of the Sierra Nevada Range. Take Highway 32 to the Humboldt Road (County Road 91422) to the Jonesville Snowmobile Staging Area. Start at forest road 27N07 off of the Humboldt Road. Skiers are reminded to park away from the groomed trails so snowmobiles can access them. Elevation ranges from 4,800 to 6,000 feet. The average snow pack is 3 feet on the lower elevations and up to 5 feet or more at Colby Mountain Lookout. Trails are marked with aqua-blue diamonds and signed to indicate skill level. The cross-country ski trails in this area are closed to all motorized vehicles.

Downhill Skiing Opportunities

Stover Mountain is a small ski area on national forest land, approximately four miles southwest of Chester on County Road 316A. The area is seasonally operated under a special use authorization from the Forest Service to a local ski club. It is popular with families and teens. Stover Mountain has groomed runs, a poma lift, rustic warming hut and restroom. For information, please contact:

Winter Recreation on the Hat Creek Ranger District

Snowmobiling Opportunities

Ashpan Snowmobile Area is located just off Highway 44/89 approximately 4 miles northeast of the north entrance to Lassen Volcanic National Park. Ashpan has 35 miles of groomed trails. Associated with the Ashpan trail system are approximately 30 miles of groomed trails located in Latour State Forest. These connected trail systems travel through mixed conifer forests and from the higher elevations offer spectacular views of Lassen Peak, Mt. Shasta and the upper Sacramento Valley. The Ashpan/Latour Snowmobile trails are rated easy to moderate in difficulty level. A warming hut and restrooms are available for visitor use at the staging area.

Wheeled Vehicle Opportunities

Potato Buttes Challenge is a 17 mile route for 4-wheelers who enjoy adventure in the snow. Drivers can start from Old Station along forest road 33N22 or at Ashpan on forest road 32N13.

Cross-Country Ski Adventures and Sledding/Tubing Fun

Esikimo Hill is a developed snow play area located on Highway 44/89 one mile north of the entrance to Lassen Volcanic National Park. It is very popular with families. A large parking area and restrooms are provided. Cross-country skiers also enjoy tours of the area. Alcohol is prohibited at this site.

Winter Recreation in Lassen Volcanic National Park

Lassen Volcanic National Park offers a multitude of winter recreation activities. Although access for vehicles is restricted in the winter months, the park is never closed. Primary access in the winter is via the Manzanita Lake entrance on Highway 44/89 at the north end and the entrance on Highway 89 at the south end.

Winter enthusiasts of the park enjoy backcountry skiing, snowboarding, snowshoeing and winter play in the deep snow pack. Quiet winter solitude is available for those that make their way on skis or snowshoes just a few miles in from the access points of the park.

Because of avalanche hazards, all backcountry users are advised to check current conditions with a ranger before entering the backcountry. All overnight backcountry visitors are required to obtain a wilderness permit. Minimum avalanche equipment includes an avalanche beacon (transceiver), shovel and probe pole. Snowmobiling and ATV travel is not permitted in Lassen Volcanic National Park.

It is illegal to have any wheeled vehicle on a groomed snowmobile trail at any time, or to have any motorized vehicle in any of the closed areas identified on the map. To do so is a violation of Title 36 CFR 261.50 (a) and (b).






Latour State Forest


