Your firewood permit is only valid on Mt. Hood National Forest Land.

Forest Roads are not maintained for winter travel. You are likely to encounter snow when visiting higher elevations on the National Forest. The firewood area on the 58 road (described below) may be inaccessible due to snow.

The Mt. Hood National Forest strongly encourages you to have a Forest or District map in your possession while traveling Forest roads. Know where you are!

ATTENTION: Help us keep the firewood program going. **It is illegal to fall standing trees, dead or alive.** If you see this activity, please get a description of the vehicle, license plate number and the time of day and contact Law Enforcement or your local District office. Do not approach these people. They are usually cutting very large trees regardless if they are live or dead. You can call the Ranger District, or the Tip Line. Thank you, and be safe out there.

General Information & Firewood Opportunities


Zigzag District: Use the Special Request Process for firewood collection on this district.

Clackamas District:

4220 Road: Wood cutting within 100 feet of the 4220 road up to 0.9 miles past the end of the paved section – down Lodgepole, mixed Douglas-fir and hemlock.

58 Road: Wood cutting within 100' of the 58 road as shown on the map and described on page two. Species make up is a mix of Lodgepole, Douglas-fir and hemlock. Diameters are smaller and most range from 12 inches and less. Elevation of firewood area is 3,400 - 4,300 feet.


Firewood Area Map for 58 Road



Wood Cutting is allowed on Forest Service land within the road prism and within 100 feet of the road in areas not shaded in gray, or hash marked. In the non- gray shaded areas of the map there are slash piles located along the 58, 5860, 58-240, 58-250, and 5880. Slash piles vary in size. Use extreme caution if collecting wood from slash piles, as they can be very unstable. No firewood cutting on Warm Springs Reservation land (shown in hash marked area on map). Wood cutting is allowed only within the road prism in areas where roads overlap with gray shaded area on map. Do not take vehicle off the main roads – park on the shoulder so that you do not block traffic. Here are some examples of what you can expect to see:



The photos below showing snow on the road were taken Monday 11 – 18-2013, on the 58 road just below High Rock. Elevation approximately 4,100 feet.



Rules and Regulations

In addition to “General and Other Conditions” listed on the back of your permit, violation of any of the following rules can result in fines and/or suspension of firewood cutting privileges.

1) WOODCUTTING IS PROHIBITED in timber sale areas (examples of timber sale areas are as follows, but not limited to, where standing trees and/or downed logs are painted, boundary flagging is present, logging equipment is operating or stationary, log decks are present, where stumps are present and it appears trees have been cut down) **developed campgrounds, Wilderness Areas, Late Successional Reserves, Research Natural Areas, riparian areas** (riparian areas are defined as land within **300 feet** of water such as springs, streams, wet meadows, floodplains and overflow channels) **and all other areas posted closed to woodcutting unless otherwise indicated on the Weekly Information Sheet.**

2) Your permit is only valid on Mt. Hood National Forest land. The Forest recommends that you have a map in your possession while hunting for and collecting your firewood. Wood cutting on non-Forest Service land is not authorized under your permit. Look for indicators that may help you determine whether or not you are on Mt. Hood National Forest Land. *Forest Service roads (when marked) will be marked with brown carsonite signs accompanied by 4 numbers (for example: 4670) or 7 numbers (indicating main road and spur road (for example: 4670 210). Forest Service gates when open or closed are usually green or brown.* Areas where clear-cuts are present, where gates are not brown or green, where road signs and numbers are not as described can be assumed as non-Forest Service land. If you are unsure about where you are, do not cut. Submit a Special Request or call to find out if the area is ok.

3) Woodcutting activity is only permitted within road prisms and/or within 100 feet of open forest roads. *Examples of closed forest roads, are roads that are blocked by a gate, guard rail, constructed berm, large boulders, scarified ground where the original road surface has been “ripped up”, or signed as closed. See the Roads Table for the Clackamas River Ranger District for specific road by road information.*

4) Woodcutters must comply with all road closures, seasonal and temporary.

5) Off road travel is not authorized while collecting firewood. Park on the shoulder or in a safe constructed wide spot to gather firewood.

6) Do not cut trees (standing and/or down) marked with paint, signs, and/or wildlife tags. Only the collection of recently downed trees is allowed. Trees that have cavities in them and/or botanical life growing from them, should be left for wildlife and nutrient cycling.

7) It is PROHIBITED to cut standing trees.

8) Protect all live trees and other vegetation during removal activities.

9) The only power equipment authorized for use are: chainsaws and small hydraulic splitter, unless otherwise prohibited in specific cutting areas. Winching or using a cable to drag out firewood is not allowed.

10) Each household may purchase up to 5 cords of personal use firewood annually. Cost is \$10.00 per cord; minimum purchase two cords per permit (\$20.00).


11) Fill out the Product Quantity Removal Record on your signed permit. The Product Quantity Removal Record is located above the signature line on your permit.

12) A new load tag must be validated by completely removing the month and day that you are transporting your firewood. The validated tag must be attached at the back of the load prior to moving the vehicle and must be clearly visible. One tag is required for every 1/2 cord of firewood, or any portion thereof. See Cord Wood Illustrations


13) Remove all slash from roads and ditches. Pack out ALL garbage you generate from your activities (examples include: lunch trash, beverage containers, cigarette butts, toilet paper, gas cans, broken chains etc...)
