


Wallow Fire Update

June 27, 2011



Wallow Fire Facts:

Location: Apache, Navajo, Graham, and Greenlee Counties, Fort Apache Indian Reservation, San Carlos Apache Indian Reservation, Arizona; Catron County, New Mexico

Date Started: 05/29/2011

Cause: Human – under investigation

Size: 538,048 acres total; 15,407 acres in N.M.

Wallow Fire Update.

The fire will continue to back downhill into Strayhorse Creek and Blue Canyon. The focus of suppression efforts in the southeast portion of the fire continues to be in the Blue River drainage with the objective to keep the fire south of Forest Road 205, west of Dry Blue Creek and the Blue River, North of Forest Road 475 north and east of US 191. The threat continues to residential, commercial and out buildings in the Blue area. Structure protection and patrolling of the line for hot spots in the vicinity of Luna continues. Burn Area Emergency Response (BAER) treatments are being implemented starting today.

On the fire's edge from US 191 continuing clockwise to Nutrioso, Ariz., crews are working at least 300 feet into the burned area extinguishing all visible smokes. US 191 and other roads are closed because of continued fire suppression and to ensure public and firefighter safety. Hazard tree removal is being conducted along US 191 in preparation for a future reopening of the highway. Crews are working to repair firelines and fences that were damaged during the fire. Winds over the past several days have demonstrated the security of these lines along this portion of the fire's edge. Aircraft and firefighters are patrolling for fire and smoke, which will be visible in scattered islands well within containment lines.

Elk are continuing to create a safety hazard as they are present on or near most of the highways and roads, especially at night and early morning. There have been at several vehicle collisions with elk.

Temperatures will continue to be hot and dry. Conditions will be mostly sunny with a high temperature near 85. Light winds are forecast becoming southwest between 12 and 15 mph with gusts as high as 24 mph. Minimum relative humidity will range from 8-12 percent in the afternoon.

WALLOW FIRE NOTICES

Road Closures according to Arizona Department of Transportation: <http://www.azdot.gov>

- US 191 is closed between Alpine to north of Clifton (milepost 176-253).
- SR 261 (mileposts 395-413) and SR 273 (mileposts 383-394), to Big Lake & Crescent Lake are closed.
- Forest Road 281 is closed two miles south of its junction with US 180.
- All Forest Service and private facilities inside the road closures are not available to the public.

Closures and Restrictions:

- **San Carlos Apache Indian Reservation:** Fire Restrictions and area closures remain in effect.
- **Apache – Sitgreaves National Forest:** The Springerville, Alpine, and Clifton Ranger Districts of the Forest remain under a forest closure until further notice. A closure order is in effect for portions of the Sitgreaves side of the National Forest. - **Fort Apache Indian Reservation:** Partial area closures are in effect for the eastside of the Fort Apache Indian Reservation. See <http://www.wmat.nsn.us/>

The National Weather Service on potential flooding: The Wallow Fire burned vast portions of the White Mountains including areas of steep terrain which will make numerous locations vulnerable to flash floods and debris flows even in moderate intensity (10 – 15 minutes) rains. Some area streams and rivers are likely to see flows beyond anything seen in decades if typical or above average rains occur. Residents should be aware that area roadways may become impassible due to mud, rock and debris slides or due to streams and washes overwhelming existing culverts and bridges.

- **Public Safety:** Smoke from the ongoing wildfires in Arizona will continue to impact residents in the Wallow Fire area including southwestern N.M. - Apache County and local Fire Departments have begun identifying locations for staging of sandbags in anticipation of the monsoon season. More information will be provided as locations are confirmed.

Rehabilitation:

Field assessments documenting resource damages have been completed on Tribal lands and final reports are being prepared. Burned Area Emergency Response (BAER) team assessments continue and will result in an Emergency Stabilization and Rehabilitation Plan, which will recommend priority actions that will be accomplished in the near future. The assessment process should be complete within two weeks. Long term restoration and salvage needs will be addressed after the environmental analysis is finished.
