Jocko Trail #34

Distance: This trail is 9.7 miles long from the trailhead at Lindbergh Lake. From the Crystal Lake South TH it is 5.1 miles to the end of the Swan Lake District. To continue beyond this point you need a tribal permit.

Difficulty: Easy, gradual grade to Buck Lake

USGS Quad: Cygnet Lake, Gray Wolf, Lake Marshall

Beginning Elevation: 4,370 ft Lindbergh Lake
5,080 ft Crystal Lake TH

Ending Elevation: 6,660 ft District Boundary

Directions: Main access: From Highway 83, turn west onto Forest Service Road #906 near mile marker 31. Continue up this road for 7.4 miles to the Crystal Lake Trailhead South, located on the right. Lindbergh Lake TH: from Highway 83, turn west onto Lindbergh Lake Rd also called Forest Service Road #79 and follow for 3 miles. Continue straight instead of following signs for Road #79 for 2.4 miles to the end of county maintenance and park. Walk the private road to the start of the trailhead on the right side of the road. This trail starts on a conservation easement, please respect private property and stay on the trail.

Season: Trail usually clear of blowdown and snow by mid- July


Regulations: Part of this trail is in the Mission Mountains Wilderness which allows both hiking and horse riding, but prohibits motorized vehicles and mechanized transport which includes mountain bikes.

Mountain biking is allowed on the lower section of this trail from the Lindbergh Lake TH to the Wilderness boundary which is near the junction with trail #351.

If taking the trail from Lindbergh Lake TH please be aware that there is no parking at the trailhead. You must park on the road, then walk up the private dirt road to the trailhead. The first part of this trail travels through private property-- please be considerate.

Trail Description: The trail is a gentle grade that travels along a ridgetop through dense lodgepole forests until the Buck Lake area. There is a 4-way trail junction $\frac{3}{4}$ mile above the trailhead, take a left to go to Buck/Gray Wolf Lakes. Views are limited until Buck Lake, where the habitat is more open and there are good views of surrounding peaks.

If interested in traveling to Buck Lake, or traveling cross-country to Whelp or Gray Wolf Lakes, please note that you need a tribal permit. Tribal permits are need when recreating on their lands—contact 406-675-2700


