




HIGHLIGHTS

of program year 10/1/09 to 9/30/10

Successful and Remarkable is how I would categorize my first full year as Siuslaw National Forest Supervisor. Highlights of 2010 include:

Recovery — \$8.5 million towards ecosystem restoration, roads improvements and recreation facilities improvements.

- The Forest partnered with the Northwest Youth Corps to hand-pull European beachgrass on the Oregon Dunes to improve habitat for Snowy Plover.
- Cape Perpetua Visitor Center got new siding; campgrounds, OHV staging areas and beach parking lots were re-paved; sewer and water systems replaced or repaired; and new fully accessible toilet buildings installed in many campgrounds.



Stewardship — Three thriving community stewardship groups contribute to managing resources holistically through an entire basin. Important components include retained receipts for restoration projects and use of Wyden Authority on private lands.



Outreach and Education

— Field Rangers (part of a Forest Service Valuing Place pilot program at special places in Washington and Oregon) at Oregon Dunes Day Use site, saw over 10,000 visitor contacts this summer sharing a wealth of information on geology, wildlife, or recreation opportunities.
