REGULATIONS

BEAR ACTIVITY

Is increasing in this area. Special **food storage regulations are in effect** and apply to the Bridger-Teton National Forest from the north side of the Snake and Hoback Rivers to the border of Yellowstone National Park
36 CFR 261.58 (cc) \$175

CAMPING LENGTH OF STAY IS LIMITED

Dispersed campsites may be occupied for a **maximum of 5 days in the Fall Creek Area** (May 1 to Labor Day) 36 CFR 261.58 (a) \$125

CAMPFIRE USE

Use an established site with a pre-existing fire ring. **Never leave a fire unattended**, completely extinguish your fire before leaving the area with water; **it must be cold to the touch**. 36 CFR 261.5 (d) \$225


MOTOR VEHICLE USE

All motor vehicle use **must occur on designated routes**, comply with seasonal restrictions, and with limitations on the type of vehicle permitted on each designated route.
CFR 261.13 \$225

LITTER

Leaving litter exposed and in an unsanitary condition **is prohibited** 36 CFR 261.11 (b) \$175

Munger Mountain is a Multi-Use Area

The privilege of use carries the responsibility to share the trails. Please do your part to make every trail interaction a positive one. A word of thanks for courteous behavior goes a long ways.



Mountain Bikers

- Yield right of way to horses and hikers.
- Announce your presence when approaching someone from behind.
- Downhill riders yield right of way to uphill riders

Horse Riders

- Know your horse. Easily spooked or inexperienced horses should not be ridden on multi-use trails.
- Offer courteous passing instructions to others; don't assume others know what to do.
- Reduce trail wear: Don't ride when trails are muddy

Motorcyclists

- Designated trails are open for use July 1st – September 9th annually
- Obtain an Wyoming State ORV permit
- Yield right of way to other trail users

Dog Owners

- Scoop the poop. Bring a bag.
- Your dog must be under voice control. This means your dog comes immediately upon command and stays within sight. Carry a leash if you have ANY doubt about control.
- Please bring no more than 2 dogs per group - leash the extras.

WILDLIFE

• Avoid surprising animals by making noise and staying alert especially on bushy sections of trail. Headphones can limit your ability to hear animals and other people.

• **DO NOT APPROACH ANIMALS.** Give them plenty of space. Back away slowly. Moose often will not move out of the trail so you may need to go off trail around them.

• Keep dogs close by your side to avoid having your dog bring an angry animal back to you or having a moose kick your dog. Carry a leash. **DO NOT ALLOW** your dog to chase wildlife.
