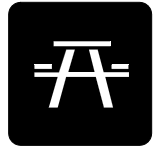


Norway Point

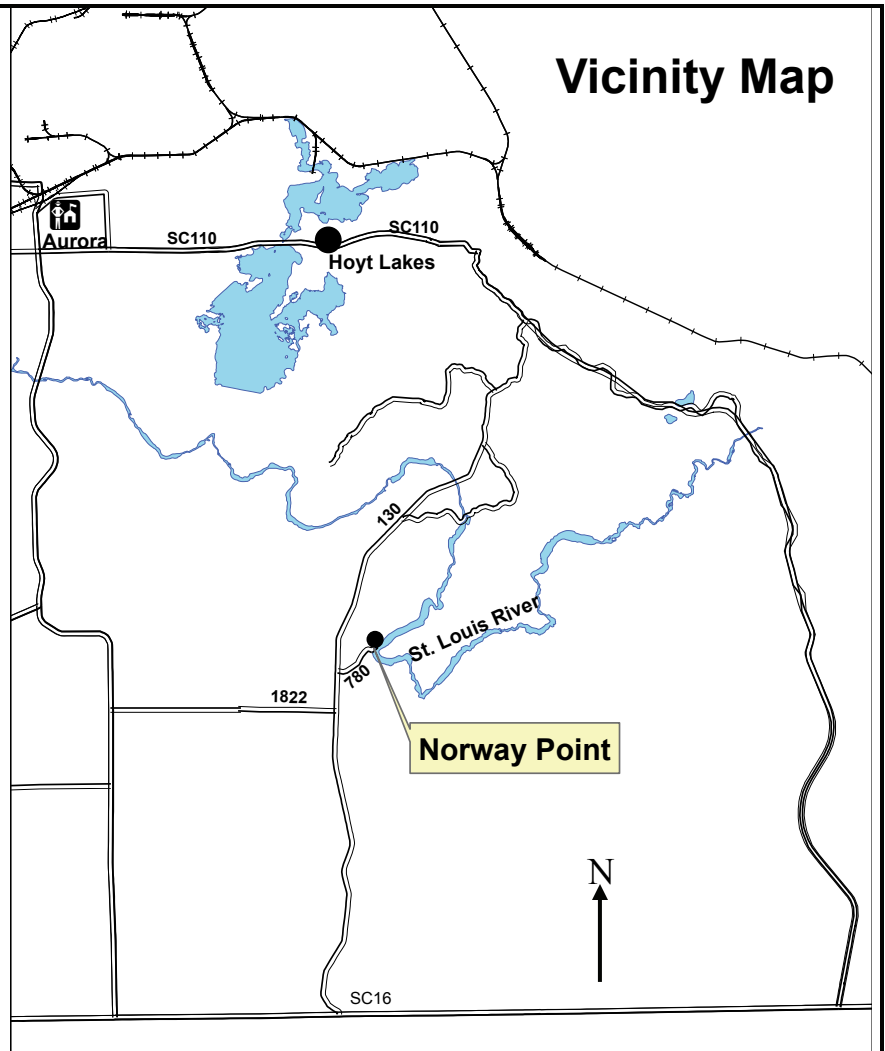

Location

Norway Point is located about 7 miles south of Hoyt Lakes, MN

- Take County Highway 110 east of Hoyt Lakes for 1.5 miles to F.R. 130 (Mooseline Road). This is a one-lane gravel road.
- Take a right (south) for 7 miles to F.R. 780. Take a left for 0.7 mile to the St. Louis River.

Description

- The streams and rivers of northern Minnesota are the result of glacial activity thousands of years ago. Because northern Minnesota rivers flow through bog areas, the water is often coffee-colored. This comes from the tannic acid in the bog plants.
- For more than 10,000 years, humans have lived in and used the natural resources of the St. Louis River. Artifacts of the Paleo Indians have been collected and preserved.
- The St. Louis River feeds into Lake Superior. This section flows through remote, forested areas.
- You may find northern pike, walleye, smallmouth bass and panfish in the river.
- Off Norway Point, the river is navigable by small boat and motor or canoe. Further up and down the river you will run into boulders and shallower water. A canoe is the recommended mode of travel.
