### Accomplishments Provided with Recreation Fees on the Uinta-Wasatch-Cache National Forest:

#### Mirror Lake Scenic Byway:

- Through a grant match with the State of Utah, purchased materials worth \$10,000 for a 2012 boardwalk pathway/bridge building project in the Pass Lake and Fehr Lake Trail areas.
- Groomed 38 miles of cross-country ski trails on the Beaver Creek and Lily Lake trails weekly.
- Removed approximately 15,000 hazardous bark beetle-killed trees in campgrounds, picnic areas, trailheads, and along motorized and non-motorized trails.
- Hosted weekly interpretive and education programs for local youth groups at Kamas District Office, one of the gateways to the Mirror Lake Scenic Byway. Program messages included the Forest Service mission, the role of fire and fire prevention, self-reliance, wildlife education, and land stewardship.
- In partnership with American Land & Leisure, presented 15 weekend interpretive programs at the Mirror Lake amphitheater to a total of 650 people.
- Funded staff at Bear River Ranger/Information Station and Heber-Kamas Information Station daily during the summer and two days each week during deer and elk hunting season.
- Staffed the Motorized Trail Education Trailer on weekends and special events at East Fork of the Bear River Scout Camp, on North Slope Road, and at Bear River Snowpark/ATV Trailhead.
- Funded one Wilderness Ranger who patrolled the East Fork of the Bear, Stillwater, and Main Fork drainages.
- Conducted six Leave No Trace training programs for Boy Scouts of America. A total of 227 scouts and 78 scoutmasters attended the training.
- Continued to fund the Bear Education Program and make one-on-one contact with visitors and campers about bear safety. Education efforts were focused on Fridays when visitors were generally arriving and setting up camp.

#### Special Feature

In a long-standing partnership with Wyoming Recreation Trails and Utah Parks and Recreation, over 90 miles of snowmobile trails are groomed up to four times each week! From Kamas, UT to Evanston, WY and from Soapstone Basin to Mill Hollow, snowmobilers enjoy the fruits of this partnership nearly five months every winter.

## Uinta-Wasatch-Cache National Forest Additional Accomplishments

### American Fork Canyon:

- Partnered with American Land & Leisure to repair and seal asphalt in Granite Flat Campground.
- Partnered with Timpanogos Cave National Monument to provide twice weekly interpretive tours at Cascade Springs.
- Completed phase II of Snake Creek Road reshaping and graveling.
- Partnered with Wasatch Mountain State Park to groom 35 miles of snowmobile trails.
- Completed the Tibble Fork Trail re-route, and installed new kiosk at the trailhead.
- Installed portal signs at Lower Mill Canyon Trailhead, Timpooneke Trailhead, Pine Hollow Trailhead, and Tibble Fork Reservoir.
- Repaired and replaced approximately 200 feet of post and rail fence.
- Installed approximately 200 feet of barrier rock to prevent illegal motorized activity and protect resources.
- Maintained over 70 miles of trails; work included removing over 2,000 downed trees along the trail system.
- Operated and maintained seven picnic sites, two interpretive sites, two fishing sites, seven dispersed campsites, two cross-country ski sites, and 14 trailheads.


